Prof. Wyer Becomes Librarian, Coming From Iowa (State University).

MISS GRAHAM MOTHERS CO-EDS

Several Men Take Fatal Step and Join Ranks of Benedicta.

Among the positions on the faculty several changes have been made since the end of last school year. The position of Librarian, which was filled by Dr. Jewett until the time of his death last spring, has been taken over by Prof. Malcolm G. Wyer. Professor Wyer comes from the Iowa State University, where he held the office of head Librarian, holds A. M. and A. B. degrees from the University of Minnesota, and is a graduate of the New York State Library School.

Professor Engberg, heretofore chairman of the delinquent committee, has been granted a new title in that of Executive Dean. Professor Upson will take the position formerly held by Professor Allway in the agricultural chemistry department, the latter having left for the University of Minnesota. In the forestry department Professor Duppert is succeeded by Professor Childs. Instructor Lefschetz, having accepted an offer in the mathematical department of the University of Kansas, his place will be filled by Instructor Blumberg.

Two important positions in the women's departments have been changed. Miss Bessie L. Park, coming from Courtland, N. Y., will succeed to the place of Miss Anna Day in the women's physical education department. Miss Park was last year acting director of the women's physical education department at the University of Texas.

Miss Alice B. Ensign, who was recently married and is now living in Chicago, is followed this year by Miss Mary K. Graham. Miss Graham is a graduate of Nebraska, and after taking her degree in '09 taught in the chemistry department for two years as the private assistant of Chancellor Avery, who was then in the chemistry department. Since that time she has been teaching chemistry in the high school of her home town of Dayton, Ohio.

A very noticeable number of marriages have occurred in the faculty during the summer respite. Coach Stehm was married shortly after the end of the school year to Miss Marie Douglas of Plattsmouth, who formerly attended Nebraska for two years. Likewise Dewey Harmon, of recent football fame and now assistant football coach, recently entered the state of conubial bliss. Assistant Registrar Vancil K. Greer was married to Miss Hetta Carroll of Taloga, Okla. Professor Hoffman of the Engineering school also recently became the center of congratulations.

A few small alterations have been made in the older campus buildings. New stairs have been placed in the east end of the gymnasium leading to the gallery. In the office of the elocution department a petition has divided the large room into two sections. The third floor of University building, formerly occupied by the law department, will now contain the geography and geological departments. The medical school has been entirely moved to Omaha.
