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MASTIN JOINS THE SQUAD

SWIFT END MAN RETURNS AND WILL PROBABLY GO IN TONIGHT.

FRESHMEN WORK OUT AT FARM

Reese, Promising Candidate for Backfield, Injures Knee and Will Be Out of Game for Good.

The arrival of "Cub" Mastin, the best end of last year's winning team, practically means the addition of another cylinder in the 1913 model machine which Stiehm and his assistants are turning out this fall. Mastin did not turn out for practice last night, but will probably be in uniform today. The only man whose coming has been delayed now is Towle, and it is expected that he will be on hand soon to take a hand in the game.

The varsity men who put in an appearance on the field at the beginning of the second week's practice were Captain Purdy, Howard, Halligan, Hawkins, Beck, and Racely. The freshmen are developing along essential lines of practice, and among those who are showing up well are Renfro, quarter, and reliable in pinches, and Berquist, who is new at the game, but nervy and apt. "Russ" Israel, a track man, also joined the squad.

Coach Stiehm's pupils were put through another hard workout yesterday afternoon. The freshmen were sent to the farm and the home field was used by the varsity candidates and the scrubs. After a little punting the big coach took the backfield men and the ends to one end for practise in running down under the long spirals which Howard and Purdy sent up.

Assistant Coach Dudley put the line candidates through their regular workout, including a session with old John Dumb, the tackling dummy. Then the men were lined up in scrimmage formation for a short but fast few minutes, after which they were sent in.

One of the disappointments of yesterday was the definite announcement that Herb Reese, one of the candidates for a backfield position, on whom Cornhusker supporters relied to make good, would be out of the game for good. Reese injured his knee in practice last week and reopened an old wound.

The squad will be on the field today at 3 o'clock as usual, and will go through the same program as yesterday.

CROSS-COUNTRY TO THE FORE

Preparations for the M-V Meet Held Here in November Bring Out Large Squad.

Although football engrosses the attention of most of the sport fans, a few are taking notice that the cross-country runners are out again. Official practice started Monday, when a few jogged around the cinder path. Beginning with next week, Coach Reed will begin to send his men on their regular circuit to the fair grounds and back.

Among the old men who have reported are Captain McMasters, Diers, Kratz, Kubik, and C. Anderson. Gerlau, an old Kansas Aggie long-distance man, has not yet reported, but is expected out soon. Frost, Paine, Lanz, Bates, Compton, L. Anderson, Burger, Smith, Kyle, Nelson, and Hager are among the new men eligible who have signified their intentions of trying out.

The annual Missouri Valley cross-country meet will be held here this year in November. This accounts for the interest taken this year and for the large number of candidates out.

DR. CONDRA ON COMMISSION

Reappointed a Member of Lands Committee for Conservation Congress.

Dr. G. E. Condra has again been appointed a member of the national lands committee for the National Conservation Congress. There have been some changes made in the membership of the committee, perhaps the most important being that Dr. Henry Wallace of Des Moines is to replace Mr. Coburn.

Dr. Condra's work on this committee has received very favorable comment, his report on the land frauds being published in the proceedings of the last National Conservation Congress.

NO SLUMP IN REGISTRATION

Identically the Same Number Registered This Year as Last—2079 Saturday Night—74 Late.

With Saturday night ended the week of registration for the present semester. The bustle and confusion which usually attends this week and which makes it one to be dreaded and not soon forgotten was lacking. The work went off with a smooth precision, and the freshmen who came to school with a dread of the ordeal were happily disappointed.

During the four days a total of 2,079 students were enrolled, and it is singular to note that exactly the same number had enrolled at this time last year. The usual number of tardy applicants appeared Monday, adding 74 to the regular enrollment. The big rush came on Thursday as usual. More than 600 students were enrolled on that day, which sets a high-water mark in the school's history.

That Nebraska's sons are not deserting the farm is shown by the fact that while the school of fine arts suffers a slight falling off, the school of agriculture shows a decided increase in the number enrolled. The new school of commerce, headed by Le Rossignol, has met with immediate popularity.

GAINES GETS NEW MACHINE

Second Automobile Purchased by University for Use of Departments—Condra Drives the Other.

Dr. Gaines of the University of Nebraska Agricultural department has secured, through the courtesy of Mr. Evans, purchasing agent, a brand new, four cylinder Ford. This conveyance will be used by Dr. Gaines in his work in Lincoln and throughout the state in connection with the production of serum for the cure and prevention of hog cholera. It will be kept at the State Farm in one of the buildings connected with the department of Animal Pathology.

Taking into consideration the car used by Dr. Condra in the department of Geology, the University of Nebraska can now lay claim to two automobiles.

CO-EDS WANT TO SWIM

MOVEMENT ON FOOT TO SECURE Y. M. C. A., PLUNGE AGAIN THIS FALL.

PROFICIENCY IN ART REQUIRED

Physical Department Issues Certificates With Swimming Clause Appended.—General Interest Shown.

One of the perplexing questions before the co-eds who follow the art aquatic this fall is not, "Mothers, may I go out to swim?" but rather "Miss Gittings, d'you suppose we can use the plunge?" For at present there is no place in which they can swim, and the Y. M. C. A., has not tendered the use of its plunge in the association building.

Last year the girls were allowed to use the plunge on one afternoon a week, and general interest in the sport was developed. The decided advantages possessed by swimming over other forms of sport have been made quite plain to the public of late by Miss Kellerman, and co-eds took the idea of forming a University-girls-only class.

The courtesy of the Y. M. C. A., extended over the one year only, however. This fall the question has again arisen, and is to be settled soon at the meeting of the board of Y. M. C. A. directors. One room at the Y., is said to be available for use as a permanent dressing room for the girls, and it is thought that if a sufficient demand is made by the girls themselves, the desired permission will be granted.

An added stimulus is given the movement because of a clause in the catalog of the Physical Education department, which states that no certificate will be granted unless the applicant can pass muster in swimming. Which practically necessitates the adoption of some plan permitting the girls in the department a chance in the briny depths.
