Electrical, Civil, Mechanical, and Archi-  
tectural Engineers Combine to  
Make Society Efficient—Fresh-  
men Out, First Meeting.

The first regular meeting of the Engineering Society will be held next Wednesday, October 1. This meeting will be especially for freshmen and will be in charge of the faculty.

A meeting of the board of control of the Engineering Society will be held next Thursday. Plans for the coming school year are to be proposed.

According to the revised constitution, the society will meet regularly the third Wednesday of each month. The four departmental clubs—Civil, Mechanical, Electrical, and Architectural Engineering—which have associated themselves to form the Engineering Society will successfully have charge of these meetings. This plan insures at least eight good programs for the year, most of which will consist of lectures by prominent engineers now engaged in actual work in this country.

Besides the regular meetings the society is planning several social functions for the year. In the near future a big smoker will be held in order that the upper classmen may get acquainted with the freshmen. A little later the annual Orpheum party will be given.
