NEBRASKA NOT ONLY SCHOOL LOSING MOST OF LAST YEAR'S TEAM.

CAN NOT WORK FORWARD PASS

Still Hope is Entertained by Aggies that Fair Showing May Be Made.

True, these great men have passed on, but the Manhattan team will not go down in history as a weak team when the final curtain is rung down at the end of the 1913 season. Marble is filling up Holmes' berth nicely with his 204 pounds of meat and muscle.

Coxen has slipped into Phelps' position at center, and although credited with being a better passer, yet he can never play with the vim and speed that characterized the playing of last season's all-state center. Stahl played out his three years and the coaches lost the best handler of the forward pass that Manhattan has ever had.

Simms was a quarterback that the football bugs all talked about. Taken by death from the team, his berth is causing the chief weakness experienced.

The backfield and the ends appear to be the weak parts of the Aggie squad. The ends all seem unused to the forward pass and repeatedly go through scrimmage without completing a single pass. This is some record. The kicking department is weak, none of the tyro punters having been able to keep up to the 40-yard mark consistently. Prather, last season's star kicker, has not showed up yet, but "Dame Rumor" has it that he will do so some time this week. This will be about all that the Aggies lack to put them on their feet for a good season, as Prather is a great punter and a hard line plunger from the fullback position.
