NEW MATERIAL FILLS PLACES

Secret Practice Starts Early at Kansas This Season—Surprises Expected.

University of Kansas, Oct. 3.—(Special to Daily Nebraskan.) When the University received word this fall that Captain Bramwell would not return, disappointment was felt by all the K. U. followers of football. His effective work on the team last year elected him captain and the rooters knew his place would be hard to fill. "Bill" Weidline, the husky tackle of last year, was elected to lead the team.

The new material shows up well and gives promise of capably filling the places left vacant on last year's team.

Bishop has been placed at end by the coaches and while he has not had much experience at that position, he is showing up well. Burton has been given the tackle position and all expect him to do damaging work to any team's offense. James, another one of last year's freshmen, can be counted on to do effective work at guard. Reber will do good work at the other end and Hammond at center will give some one a hard fight for the position. "Rusty" Russell, quarterback of last year's freshman team, will add strength to the quarterback material. Among the old men back this year are: Weidline, Wilson, Stenwe, Hudor, Householder, Detwilder and Parker.

Secret practice has been installed in K. U. early this season and it is thought that the coaches will spring some surprises at the first game which takes place Saturday, October 4th.

Another thing which brightens the outlook for the followers of the Crimson and Blue, is that Hargiss, formerly coach of College of Emporia, has been added to the coaching staff. By this addition, the team should be materially strengthened, as Hargiss is a good football man and has turned out some good teams.

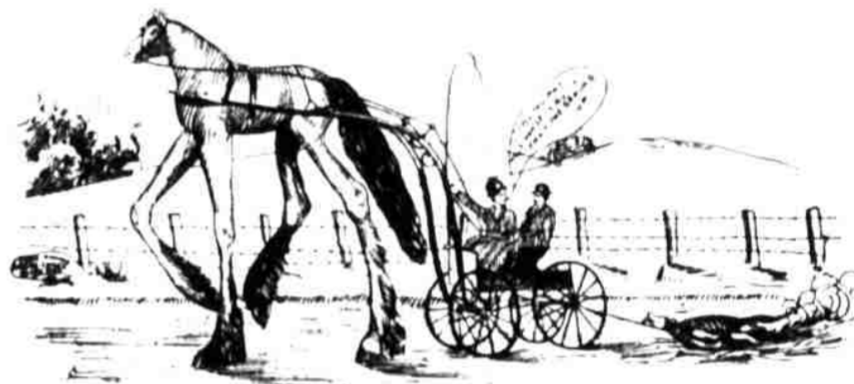
