Thursday, October 9, 1913 Tradition in the Making.

Nebraska is said to be lacking in tradition. Those expressions of school spirit which are so prominent in some universities are said to be entirely foreign to our campus. And those who make this claim use it as an argument against the efforts of those who would nevertheless arouse the spirit which is to them merely lying dormant. The claim is doubtless true to some degree, for Nebraska can hardly be said to have many spontaneous expressions of enthusiasm. But this is due to the fact that the university is still young. With only forty-four years as a background for the traditions to rest upon, it is not surprising that they are still few.

Today a tradition is in the making. It started last year when a University Anthem was chosen from among many submitted for this honor. The Anthem was featured by the Glee club, but was allowed to drop into disuse. Now it is being revived, and because of the loyalty to Nebraska which rings in each of its stanzas, and the genuine swing and rhythm in the chorus, it needs only to be properly introduced to the student body. Its acceptance is certain. As to the tradition when that anthem is sung, the Cornhusker Anthem—every Nebraskan is to rise to his or her feet, in token of honor to the university. At the rally today this practice will go into effect. Its use will continue in the football game to come. And in ten years following we expect to see it continued. Nebraska traditions are in the making, and they are in our hands.

SECRETARY TO BE IN Y. M. C. A. LOBBY ALL DAY NOW

New Arrangements Made In Order to Make It Center of Temple Activity.

The Board of Directors of the University Young Men's Christian Association voted at their meeting on Tuesday evening to make arrangements whereby the office in the lobby of the Temple building will be occupied throughout the day. At the present time, Mr. Sleeth the Employment secretary is there four hours each day. The association will arrange to have a secretary there during the hours that Mr. Sleeth is away. This will necessitate a provision for six hours. Mr. Charlesworth will take charge a part of the time and an additional man will be secured for the remainder.

The lobby is the center of the Temple building and of the life in it and it is of the utmost importance that someone should be in the office all the time. While the association is responsible for the maintenance of these men in the office will serve all interests represented in the building or connected with the university life. The plan has the approval of the Chancellor and it is the purpose of those interested to make the Temple building an even more lively center of student life and interest than it now is.
