According to reports, Lincoln is bubbling over with enthusiasm in anticipation of the advent of the northern invaders.

Nebraska will engage in the crucial game of her schedule a week from Saturday, when they meet the Gophers. The team has already won the opening game of the series, that with Washburn, in which they were victorious by a 19 to 0 score. With the incitement of this triumph, the "N" men are making every effort to be fully prepared for "Doc" Williams' men when the time comes. All the coaching that Jumbo Stiehm can muster is being applied to his "infants," and all the life that Nebraska U can call forth is being injected into the team. The cry at Lincoln is "Wallop the Gophers," "Get Minnesota."

Coach Stiehm has the faculty of springing things, especially when they are least looked for. He is at present very silent indeed, hardly uttering a word that pertains to his innermost thoughts. He is content to work and keep still. Certain it is, however, that he has been building up his team for the meeting with the Gophers, concentrating all his efforts on this future engagement. *Minnesota Daily.*
