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GREETINGS, ALUMNI.

For the second time in Nebraska history the alumni are returning to renew the bond of friendship and of loyalty to the alma mater. As the active students, we extend a hand of good fellowship to our predecessors. You who have gone through the same troubles and joys that we are experiencing daily are most welcome within the gates. You will note changes in the campus, in the throng which crowds Nebraska Field this afternoon, and in the very air or spirit of the institution, and we trust that these changes will meet with your approval. Nebraska is dealing with the problems of student and campus life which you met, and we believe that progress is being made with each year.

Certain it is that a change is being made, as the oldtimers will witness. This effecting an organization is no small task, and each year it seems to the students on the campus that some new step has been taken. And each year the organization is assuming more force. The University is fully appreciative of the work attempted by its alumni, feeling that the future of the institution is safe in their hands.
