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FINAL ARRANGEMENTS MADE YES TERDAY FOR UNION PACIFIC TRAIN NEXT MONTH.

ROUND TRIP TO COST \$7.50

Low Rate Is Given as Train Goes by the Way of the Marys ville Cutoff.

Nebraska will send a special train to Lawrence, Kas., at the time of the Jayhawker game, the middle of next month, according to information given out yesterday by Guy Reed. The trip will be made over the Union Pacific by way of the cutoff and will cost \$7.50 for the round trip, with sleepers \$1 extra each way. Tickets must be bought of Guy Reed in his new office in the basement of Administration lems. building.

The first train will start at 10 o'clock Friday night and arrive at Lawrence at 7 o'clock the next morning. Accommodations' will be made for 500, with sleepers for as many as reserve them. If more than this number wish to take the trip another section will be run shortly afterward. The return trip will be made from Lawrence Saturday night, starting at 12:30 and arriving at Lincoln at 7 o'clock Sunday morning. Any that do not desire to return till Sunday night will have their tick ets honored over any U. P. train.

The team will make the going trip on the Burlington by way of Kansas City, but returning with the special Saturday night.

PUBLISHED A MONTH EARLIER

Entirely New Plan to Be Introduced into Arrangement of Book in the Form of Running Story.

With a novel plan of arrangement for the material of the 1914 Cornhusker that will be an innovation at Nebraska and that as a plan perhaps has never been found in any annual in the country, the present staff has begun to take active steps toward the publication of the book. All former palns are to be entirely discarded and Editor Trimble announced a new one that is to be a distinct addition both to the attractiveness and the interest of the publication. The essence of the new plan is to eliminate formal departments in the book and have the material arranged in chronological order after the fashion of a magazine.

The first step in the publication of the book is the announcement to the upper classes that positively all in dividual pictures must be taken by Thanksgiving. By such a plan a double advantage is secured. In the first place, the book will be put in the hands of the students at least one month earlier than ever before. In the second place, the individual photographs, which will be set on suitable mountings, will be available as Christmas presents. A contract has been made whereby Townsend, the photog rapher, is to devote his entire time Tickets for the rooting sections for primarily to student trade from now until Thanksgiving.
