

NEW UNI IS PICTURED

CONSULTING ARCHITECTS FROM CHICAGO PRESENT PROPOSITIONS TO REGENTS.

FOUR ALTERNATIVES OFFERED

No Estimates of Cost Are Made. Although Planned as Cheaply as Possible.

Yesterday the firm of Shepley, Rutan & Coolidge of Chicago presented four proposed drafts of the new University campus, two as extended in town and two located at the State Farm. They were brought to Lincoln by Charles Hodgdon, a member of the firm. All the plans represent the latest ideas on university construction and are drawn by a firm that has designated campus and building layouts all over the United States.

As the consulting architects of the board of regents, the Chicago firm has drawn up the plans in order that a more definite idea might be formulated regarding which is the more desirable, downtown campus extension or rebuilding at the State Farm.

The Plans Downtown.

In the plan with Twelfth street closed there is a court in the center of the campus, making the campus thus in a sort of a quadrangle. This court is entered from the south on Twelfth street. On one side of the Twelfth street entrance is the political science building, and on the other is the modern languages building. At the north end of the elaborate entrance stands the museum.

This plan would partly rearrange the whole campus, with the exception of the newest engineering buildings, the library, the new law building, and another building or two, and the athletic field. On Twelfth street would be located, beginning at the west end, the new law building, fine arts, driveway or Twelfth street entrance, and modern languages building. On Fourteenth street would be modern languages, domestic science, women's gymnasium, education and technical high school buildings. On U street would be located the technical high school, the physics, zoological, men's club and athletic field. On the west, Tenth street, would be the engineering shop and the present engineering buildings.

Plenty of Room.

Under this plan there would be ample room for many other buildings not named to be located within the quadrangle, where would be located several of the buildings already standing, as well as a new mathematics building, where University Hall now is. This plan also provides for two large grandstands to seat from 12,000 to 15,000 persons.

The second downtown campus plan would leave Twelfth street open. This would provide for a sort of a court in the center of the six blocks added on the east, the entrance being made to such court from off Twelfth street. Facing Thirteenth street, under this plan, would be a large building—museum, auditorium, and fine arts combined.

On the east side, Fourteenth street, would be the fine arts, domestic science, library, and technical high school buildings. On one side of the entrance from off Twelfth street would be the political science and sociological building,

ing, and on the other the modern languages building.

This plan would mean a divided campus, on account of Twelfth street being allowed to remain open. Likewise, it would have a concealed entrance to the inner court. But it would present a beautiful view from Thirteenth street, on account of the large combined museum, auditorium and fine arts building facing southward onto that street.

Elevations a Difficulty.

The two plans for the rebuilding of

the University on the State Farm are worked out under the difficulties of the varied elevations of the land there. With both plans a long line of low machine shops would be placed next to Holdrege street on the south.

Running northward off Holdrege street is a driveway, in one plan. This driveway branches off, or rather doubles back to the southeast, at an angle of perhaps 45 degrees, thus forming as a part of the campus a triangle. To the westward the entrance off Holdrege street turns at right angles. On

one side of the arrangement is the agricultural campus, adjoining next to it the botany, zoology, and biology buildings. Next comes the science campus, and the other side the fine arts campus, and the other side the fine arts campus, around the court of which are the educational, journalism, domestic science, women's gymnasium and other buildings.

To the northward on both State Farm plans, down the hill, is the ath-

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
