

Seniors Arrange To Pay Off Debts And Give Events

At a meeting of the senior class yesterday, of which any number over the quorum of twenty was collected and retained only with difficulty, the matter of discharging the class debt and holding class functions was discussed at length. The first business of the meeting was the selection of class officers, which resulted, after a speedy election, in the choosing of Miss Louise Northrup as vice-president and Fred Keith as secretary.

After a discussion as to the possible methods which the class might employ to override their present restrictions, two were decided upon as permitted. One was to pay off the outstanding debts by an assessment and the other was the forming of a committee to assume personal responsibility for debts to be incurred. Mr. Kavan, in a very extended speech, spoke of five class departments in which money could be made for the class which had heretofore either been lost in many cases by poor management or made to enure to personal benefit. The five departments mentioned were those of the program, pin, hop, play, and prom, with the possibility of the introduction of a class fair or carnival as a money-maker. He then moved the appointment of an executive committee of nine persons to take entire charge of all departments and devote the entire proceeds to class debts after pledging personal responsibility for the financial success of each affair or transaction.

The execution of the motion as voted was halted by the motion which was passed as preliminary thereto providing that a committee of three be appointed to ascertain the rights of the class as to whether it could give affairs this year without paying off former debts by private methods involving individual responsibility, or whether the past debts must necessarily be paid off before any committee in any way representing the seniors could give affairs for the class. As the matters now stand, future action all depends upon the results of the report of the committee of three, consisting of Driscoll, Kavan and Hess, in ascertaining the ability of the class to proceed in any manner.

The class treasurer was not elected, it being a portion of Mr. Kavan's motion that the treasurer of the executive committee elected by that body from among its members be likewise the class treasurer. The following chairmen were announced on interclass committees, the remainder of the committees to be chosen by the chairman and president in private consultation: Haskell, basketball; Racely, football; Agor, debate; and Gunther, athletics. Mr. Albert Shaw was formally announced as commencement orator.
