PROFESSOR FLING EMINENT AU THORITY ON FRENCH AND EU. ROPEAN HISTORY SPEAKS

YESTERDAY A CENTURY AGO

Convocation Tuesday morning consisted of a talk by Professor F. M. Fling of the department of European history on the event of a century past

the battle of Waterloo, which was fought October 28, 1813. Fascinated by the thrilling tale of this great man's · history the audience sat the whole hour completely enthralled.

Intertwined with the story of the rise and fall of Napoleon, the scores of battles in which he figured, his marvelous victories, gigantic schemes, was told the story of Napoleon, the man, of the development of his ambitions into overpowering passions, which in the end defeated his own ends.

"Napoleon was not only a man without a country," said Professor Fling, "but he was a man without a boy-When but a boy he was obsessed with his ambition, and one of his early papers, written when he was but a boy in military school, reads as if written by a man of 35. Throughout his life. Napoleon stopped at noth but no doubt she will be a good one. ing to gain his own ends.'

The plan of Napoleon to force England off the continent was the most gigantic scheme ever attempted in the world, according to Professor Fling. He vividly outlined Napoleon's conquests up to that time, the attaining of Europe-wide power and his trip to Egypt, where he won all the battles he went into; his return to France on hearing that trouble was brewing there, and in 1799 really starting the great revolution to fermenting by be ing appointed the first of three consuls. The appointment was at that time only for ten years, but the other consula were mere figureheads, and in 1802 he was given the consulship
