Three Dollars Covers Cost of One Dozen Mounted Pictures and the Insection in the Cornhusker.

The management of the Cornhusker have just closed a contract with A. C. Townsend, photographer, 226 South Eleventh street, to take the individual and organization pictures for the 1914 Year-Book The contract expressly states that all sittings must be made before Thanksgiving. Mr. Townsend will be able to take fifty sittings a day and it will be possible for students to have sittings any time during the day, An especially attractive folder for the pictures is being prepared for students who desire to use the pictures as Christmas gifts. A particutarly low rate of three dollars per dozen for the first dozen and one dolfar for each succeeding dozen are the prices Mr. Townsend is charging for these pictures. The charge for the first dozen includes the cost of the cut and insertion in the 1914 Cornhusker.

In orde, to avoid a great deal of trouble the management has also made arrangements with Mr. Townsend to collect the money for the cuts of the organizations at the time they have their pictures taken.

It will be a great convenience both to the management and to the photographer if the juniors and seniors taken at once. The reason for the shortening of the time for the sittings is due to the fact that the 1914 Cornhusker will be ready for distribution on May 1. This is fully a month and a baif earlier than usual.
