

**PROPOSED PLANS FOR UNI
SITES ARE PUBLISHED**

Both Present Advantages and Disadvantages Which Are to Be Considered.

In cooperation with Messrs. Shepley, Rutan and Coolidge, architects, the State Journal has recently announced four tentative plans, any one of which would give the University a beautiful campus.

Two of these plans are apropos in case it is decided that the University should remain in its present location. Both of these two plans involve the purchase of the six blocks of ground east of the present campus. They differ essentially in that the first is so arranged as to permit the free use of Twelfth street, whereas in the second it is closed. For this reason the University and city authorities disapprove of the second sketch, although its possibilities for architectural beauty far exceed those of the first.

In both it is planned to demolish all present buildings, except the Administration building, the Library, Law, Physics, Engineering and Mechanic Art buildings. Many of these will be added to.

For the other alternative, that is, should the University move to the Farm site, two plans have also been submitted. The symmetry of the first plan is disturbed by the triangular court about which the Engineering College is grouped. The lack of symmetry, however, saves several acres of room. The objection to the second proposition, which erects each college about a quadrangle after the English fashion, is that it wastes valuable space. However, the latter arrangement is receptive of more artistic landscaping and more imposing buildings. Should this plan be followed, a natural depression in the ground to the northeast would be utilized as a sight for a stadium.

It is to be realized that these plans are merely tentative and that the final arrangement may be a compromise or something entirely new.

February 16, Charter Day, is to be given over to special meeting of alumni and friends for discussion of this vital question.

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**DECIDE TO USE GRANITE
IN STATUE OF KOMENSKY**

Although Much more Expensive, Bohemians Wish to Erect Lasting Memorial.

At a meeting last Saturday the Bohemian Club decided to make the Komensky statue of granite. Although this will be an additional expense, those in charge of this inspiring undertaking feel that they want to have the best and something that will be permanent. Through the suggestion of Mr. Smyrah of Milligan, notices will be sent to the various Bohemian lodge organizations throughout the state to let them know that the campaign for funds is on and for just what purpose. Already between eleven and twelve hundred dollars have come into the treasury without solicitation, and with such interest shown it is hoped that sufficient funds to cover all expense can be secured in reasonable time. The convention which was to be held here during the unveiling of the statue will be held in Chicago because of the indefiniteness as to the location of the campus.

Much progress is being made along the line of Bohemian in all parts of the country and high schools are instituting different courses or methods of instruction in Bohemian. Crete has a Bohemian Club in parliamentary practice. Assistance is being asked for from the Slavonic Department of our school and Miss Hrbek seems more than willing to do her share to promote the work.

A meeting of the Bohemian Club will be held next Friday evening and Mr. A. E. Sheldon has consented to give a talk on the history of Nebraska.

The Y. W. C. A. membership campaign is progressing nicely. At 1 o'clock on Monday the thermometer registered seventy-eight new members for the Blue, forty-three new ones for the Yellow. The contest closes at 12 noon, on Wednesday.

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
