BIG ANNUAL LUNCHEON HELD IN OMAHA THURSDAY

Many Nebraskans Re-Union During Meeting of State Teachers' Association—Influence and Growth of University Depicted.

A luncheon was given by the alumni of the University of Nebraska at the Rome hotel Thursday during the meeting of the State Teachers' Association in Omaha. Chancellor Avery, Dr. I. S. Cutter, N. M. Graham, Guy E. Reed and Prof. H. W. Caldwell gave informal talks. Miss Eva O'Sullivan, vice president of the state alumni association, presided. Plates were set for 200, and when the news got around that the banquet was to be held the alumni of Omaha and from the teachers in the association more than filled the hall. Several were turned away, through lack of room.

Dr. Cutter's address was on the work of the medical school at Omaha, emphasizing the fact that its position in the metropolis of the state kept alive work of the University as nothing else connected with the institution could do.

He was followed by Mr. Graham, superintendent of the South Omaha public schools. He spoke of the pride of the university that is felt by the alumni and their enthusiasm and interest in all things pertaining to it.

Alumni Dues Reduced.

Guy E. Reed, manager of athletics, spoke for the state alumni association, stating among other things that the annual due of the association had been reduced from \$5 to \$1.

Prof. Caldwell's address concerned the university as a factor in civilization, without attempt to localize the influence. He declared, however, that the University of Nebraska would undoubtedly play as important a part in the development of ideals and betterment of conditions as any such institution in the United States.

Chancellor Avery closed with an explanation of the progress made in definite plans for the erection of additional buildings and obtaining additional grounds for the institution. He explained how the procuring of the land to be added to the campus lies with the voters of the state as well as the steps that have been taken to put the plans before the regents of the university and alumni.

CROSSCOUNTRY RUN TODAY

FIVE UNIVERSITIES OF MISSOURI VALLEY CONFERENCE COMPETE FOR HONORS.

WILL FINISH DURING W.-U. GAME

Kansas, Kansas Aggies, Ames, Missouri, and Nebraska Will Run—Dope on Results Not Certain.

With five universities of the middle west competing, represented by thirty men, all told, the annual Missouri Valley cross country run today promises to be an athletic event of the season. It has been arranged that the finish will be staged on the cinder track of the athletic field during the Wesleyan game, adding to the spectacular interest in the meet. The start will be made at 3:15 from Tenth street, west of the athletic field.

All of the teams were on the ground last night, with the exception of the Kansas Aggies who arrive this morning. The personnel of the teams is as follows:

Ames: Snyder (capt.), MacWalter, Giess, Hoin, Seder, Nahasted.

Kansas: Edwards, Deewall, Spreir, Vermillion, Ross.

Missouri: Perry, Hurst, Fenley, Erweet, Hogan, Trchune.

Kansas Aggies: Entries not known.
Nebraska: McMasters, Goetze, Anderson, Grautz, Gerlau and Kubik.

The dope on the result is not at all conclusive. Nebraska is represented by a "dark horse" team, since only two of the men have competed in a previous race of this sort. Hutto, of the Kansas Aggie team, is touted throughout the valley as a speedy man in cross country, and it is expected that he will be the individual star of the race. Goetze of Nebraska has been picked by some to run a close second. However, there is no way of forecasting the result. Ames and Missouri held a dual meet earlier in the season, to the advantage of Ames, but the other schools have no way of comparing themselves to the results of this meet.

Missouri retained the laurels of the race last year, winning over the other four valley schools on her home course at Columbia. Nebraska finished last, but started work to efface that record immediately.

Although a change of weather set in last night, with a flurry of cold wind and a hint of rain or snow, no change was announced in regard to the plans for the run. Nothing but a severe touch of weather will necessitate a postponement, although inclement weather would have the effect of keeping down the speed of the men and preventing the possibility of establishing a record.
