**A WIDESPREAD MOVEMENT.**

It is evident that a constant revolt  
against exaggerated college spirit is  
proceeding through the country. The  
movement has been on for some time  
nobody knows when it began, unless  
it was when the first class rebelled  
at the University of Chicago. It has  
gained wide publicity thru the columns  
of the daily paper, of the latest and  
it appears to a great degree. In fact  
it is the larger institutions, both pri-  
vate and state, which are dealing with  
the question rather than the smaller  
schools.

By this "exaggerated college spirit"  
is meant that sort of spirit which car-  
ries campus rules and freak class gov-  
erning laws to the extreme. The spirit  
which allows men with a year of col-  
lege to their credit to lord it over the  
first year students. Which makes it  
incumbent upon a freshman to doff  
his hat when passing certain limits  
set by the upper classmen.

Very little of this extreme spirit is  
noticed in the western state institu-  
tions, with the possible exception of  
the northern universities. All institu-  
tions have it to a degree, but there  
are forms of the spirit which are of no  
harm, and some that have an effect for  
good, as far as bringing the freshmen  
to a realization of the ideals of the  
institution. In the extreme east, which  
has always set the pace in under-  
graduate hazing, the attention of the  
Princeton students is being called to  
the evil of their system. All precedent  
has been broken in the attacks on the  
freshman rules, and the Daily Prince-  
tonian has led a fight which strips the
