## COME OUT WITH YOUR TORCHES

In former years the torchlight parade has been considered as the biggest thing of the year next to the shirt tail parade and is viewed with as much interest by the townfolk as the maneuvers of company "Q". The fantastic effects produced by the gleaming of the dancing torchlights have a peculiar attraction for the fair coed and the loyal supporters of the greatest team in the west and as a consequence "Q" street is jammed with a seething mass of humanity. This crowd usually follows the gyrations and winding of the parade to the depot and aids in the big demonstration there.

The innocents have received the torches and these will be placed on sale in front of the Rag office today for fifteen cents. They will be filled with oil and all the purchaser will have to do tonight is touch a lighted match to the wick and stuff is off. At the meet last year Nebraska carried off the cup and due to the fine showing made in the race on Saturday it is probable that they may carry off one this year too.

## SCRIMMAGE BEHIND LOCKS

STIFF SECRET PRACTICE WITH FROST ELEVEN WEDNESDAY.

### FORWARD PASSES WORK POORLY

Varsity Relying on Straight Football to Defeat Kansas—Pony Backfield Performing in Great Style—Last Scrimmage Today.

It had not been rated last week, but Coach Stiehm put the Cornhuskers through one of the stiffest scrimmages of the season. It lasted one hour. In addition to this over an hour was spent in a last signal practice.

The varsity scrimmaged with the freshman eleven, the latter using Kansas plays. Purdy, Rutherford and Cameron did not participate in the mixup as the coach is fearful that these men might receive further injuries which would put them out of the Kansas game for good. These three men were in the signal practice, however, and will undoubtedly be in first class shape for the all important scrap Saturday.

### The Neophytes Score.

For the first few minutes the frosh eleven rushed the varsity off their feet. Repeated line smashes by Chamberlain, Porter and Erhart, using Kansas formations, went through the scarlet and cream line like a bullet through cheese. Almost all the plays had to be stopped by the secondary defense. Coffey, Elwell, DeLamatre and Mastin were the mainstays in the defense. Mastin made several spectacular plays, getting in from wide right end and stopping freshman formations before they were under headway.

Elwell received a bad shoulder bruise and went to the gym. Coffey taking his place at right half. Within ten minutes the freshmen had scored. Stiehm then gave them the ball on their own five yard line with the varsity playing defensive, and they
