The Topeka Journal has this to say about the Washburn-Kansas game last Saturday:

The Washburn players, not complaining of defeat or hinting of unfair play, do blame the university men for Hardy's injuries. With the natural high feeling against colored football players on account of the trouble with Nebraska over Ross, the university men were pointed to the Washburn speedy halfback. It is said also among the players that there was an attempt

to "rough" Trotter, the man with the educated toe.

Hardy probably will be out of the game for the rest of the season. There is only a slight chance of his entering the Aggie game Thanksgiving. If he does, it will be only for a quarter. The injury is in his old troublesome knee.

pushed the regular up and down the field twice.

Varsity Gets the Ball

On an attempted dropkick by the regular which fell short the varsity got the ball. DeLamatre, Coffey, Hall, Howard and Halligan with Tack at the pivot position, battered the ball back to their goal line, the ball going over for a touchdown. The touchdown was made in five seconds.

Stiehm then gave the varsity the ball on their five yard line, letting the frosts play defensively as the varsity had done earlier in the practice. Hardy line smashes scored another touchdown within five minutes for the varsity. DeLamatre is hitting the ball like a cyclone, picking his holes well and is fast and shifty on his feet.

Forward Passes Work Poorly

The varsity tried several forward passes in their scrimmage with the freshmen but they worked very poorly. The team does not seem to have the knack of shifting enough to make the passes successful. The greatest portion of the plays, however, were line smashes. As Kansas has been used to the open style of play so far this season the coaches think that straight football will be the best thing to use against the Jayhawkers. There will be but one more scrimmage before the game and that will be on afternoon.
