"The 9 to 0 victory of Nebraska over
Kansas at Lawrence Saturday leaves
Missouri only a chance for a tie with
the whirlwind Cornhusker eleven for
the Missouri Valley conference cham-
pionship. The Tigers have before them
the task of whipping the Jayhawkers
by a better score than the Nebraskans
made. In the event that the Tigers
should succeed in this rather imposing
task Missouri might chime in for a
share of the championship. Still, the
majority of the critics probably would
give the title to the Cornhuskers by the
holdover route, citing the Nebraska vic-
tory over the Minnesota eleven as
evidence of the high class of the Ne-
braska machine and urging the de-
feat of the Tigers at the hands of the
Illini as direct testimony tending to
lower the rank of the Brewer-Schulte
band.

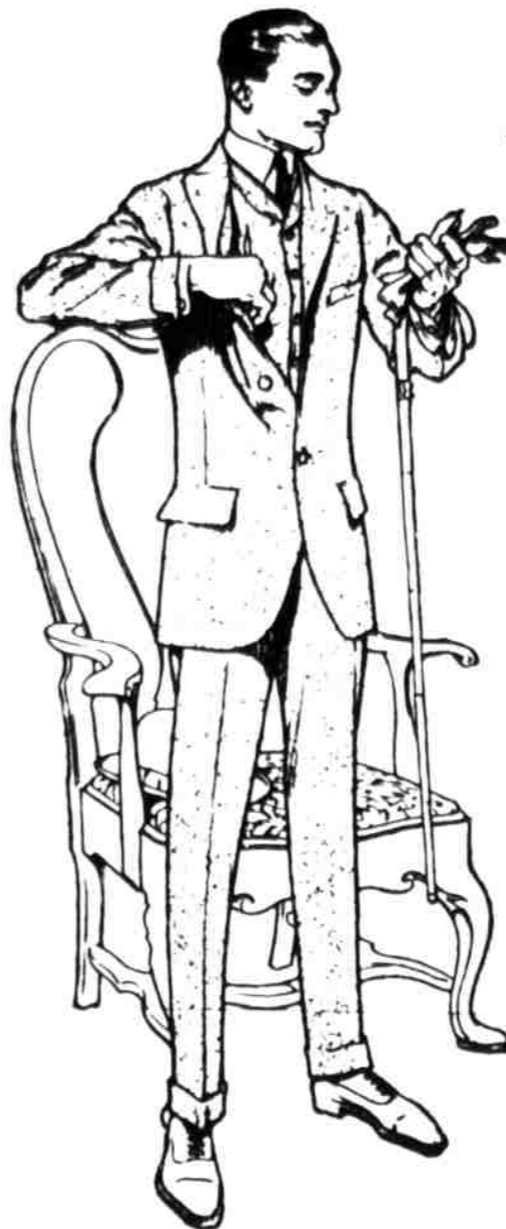
"Only Iowa now lies in the path of
