BIG BATTLE SATURDAY

CORNHUSKERS OF NEBRASKA
WILL PLAY AGAINST HAWK-
EYES OF IOWA.

MODERN FOOTBALL A FEATURE

Cornhuskers In Prime Condition for
Game—Iowa Players Arrive To-
day—Will Be at Mass
Meeting.

The last game of the season is before us. Tomorrow the champion Cornhuskers will meet the fast Iowa eleven on Cornhusker field at three o'clock. It promises to be the fastest, if not the hardest, battle of the schedule.

Yesterday afternoon Coach Stiehm put his disciples through the last scrimmage before the game Saturday. It was another of the so-called "tag" scrimmages and was held behind locked doors. During the scrimmage the Freshmen again used the Iowa formations and the entire time was spent in perfecting the Cornhusker defense to be used in breaking up these plays.

The Cornhuskers are growing proficient in the gently art of smashing the Iowa formations as played by the frost eleven. If they do as well in the real game, they will have Iowa's goat before the contest is many minutes old. This evening the men will run through light signal practice and then put in a lot of sleep and rest in order to be in first class condition for the last game of the season.

Team Is In Good Shape.

The old bugaboo of injuries seems to have deserted the Cornhusker camp and for once in the season all the regulars are in prime condition. They are now in the best form of the year and should put up a wonderful game. The cripples have all rounded into form. The same line up as played against Minnesota and Kansas will start the game.

Nebraska's Chances of Victory.

Nebraska's chances of victory rest in the ability of the Cornhuskers in breaking up the fast, sweeping end runs of the Iowa eleven. End runs have been the method by which the Hawkeyes have rolled up such large scores on their opponents. With the practice the Cornhuskers have been receiving in breaking up these plays when used by the freshmen, and are sufficiently acquainted with the looks of the formations that they should be able to break them up when they get started.

If they can do this the game will be another Cornhusker victory. For the Hawkeyes are not acquainted with the style of football played by the Nebraskans and will be unable to stop the mighty Cornhusker offense. With their end runs broken and useless, Iowa will be helpless because of the fact that their line is weak and light. The Hawkeyes average about 167

GELLATY IS MANAGER

MUSIC COMMITTEE APPOINTS
MAN TO MANAGE GLEE CLUB
FINANCES THIS SEASON

CLUB PLANS MANY CONCERTS

Denver and Coast Cities to Be In-
cluded In Extended Spring
Tour.

After much delay the manager of the Glee club has been appointed. Harry C. Gellatly, the new manager, has been instructed to take up the work at once. This announcement was made Tuesday after the applicants had been sifted down to two candidates. The final decision was made between Gellatly and Kavan. There is considerable honor as well as work attached with this position as the manager must assume some amount of the responsibility for a successful season.

The Glee club is assured of several short trips, and if present plans are perfected it is probable that a trip will be taken to California. An offer has been made by the Santa Fe R. R., to the effect that if the Glee club furnishes twelve entertainments, the company will take them out to California and pay all expenses.

It is highly probable that this offer will be accepted. The object of the R. R. company is to give entertainments for the benefit of their working men in the various large cities along their line.

Of course at present these plans are only on paper and nothing definite has been determined upon. However, should this plan be carried out it would certainly be of great advertising benefit to the university. In case this trip is thrown out of consideration by many possible objections, another trip is planned that is more likely to be carried out. This is a trip to Denver over the U. P., and back over the M. P., filling various dates along the route.

The home concert which is usually held in the Temple will be held sometime at the first of the year. The Glee club will continue their usual practice and get in form for any possible trips. This organization usually turns out some good programs and if they succeed in their plans they will surely make a "hit" wherever they go.

Manager Gellatly's office will be in the Alumni headquarters, basement of Administration building.
