## COLUMBIA STUDENT WINS ESSAY PRIZE

#### Contests Are Held Annually Through Generosity of Hart Schaffner and Marx.

Prizes amounting to two thousand dollars have been awarded to winners of the Hart Schaffner Marx e-say contests for 1913. The first prize of one thousand dollars was won by Arthur E. Suffern, a graduate student of the Columbia university, for a paper entitled "Conciliation and Arbitration in the Coal Industry in the United States."

The competition is divided into two classes, graduates and undergraduates. The second prize in the graduate contest was given to G. P. Watkins, formerly a graduate student of Cornell university, now of the public service sommission, New York city. He produced a paper entitled "Welfare as an Economic Quality," and received a prize of five hundred dollars for it. Honorable mention was given to W.

J. A. Donald, a graduate student of the University of Chicago, for a paper on "The Canadian Iron and Steel Industry."

In the contest among undergraduates the first prize of three hundred dollars went to Jenss Waldo Myers, Cornell university, for a paper entitled "Unemployment,"

The second prize for undergraduates amounting to two hundred lollars was given to Fred W. Eckert of Northwestern university, who wrote an essay on "Government Regulation of Public Utility Securities."

The contests, which are held annually through the generosity of Hart Schaffner & Marx, require a period of a year in preparation and students from many universities and colleges in the United States and Canada are among the aspirants for honors.
