Y. M. C. A. Divides Work of Committees Into Two Special Divisions

A new arrangement for committed service is now being put into operation in the work of the University Young Men's Christian Association. This plan was unanimously adopted by the board of directors at their last meeting. According to this scheme, the committee service of the association is divided into two parts, viz, the planning feature and the promotion feature.

The first of these will be done by the separate committees for the work of their respective departments. The committees will study their special fields and then devise the plans which will most effectually accomplish the things needed to be done.

The second feature, the promotion, will be done by the combined force of all committees, called the "round up." This body of committeemen will put into execution throughout the student body the plans of the various departments.

For the furtherance of this latter work, the "round up" will meet weekly for luncheon and discussion at 12:30 p. m. on Saturday. The first of these meetings will be held next Saturday. After luncheon the meeting will open with ten minutes of sharp pointed devotion by Rev. H. H. Harmon. This will be followed by reports from several committees. The last feature of the meeting will be a practical talk by Supt. F. M. Hunter on "The Why and Why Not of the University Young Men's Christian Association."

Girls basketball teams are now being formed from the promising material offered in the freshmen class. An interclass tournament will be held the last of the semester, perhaps the last week in January, and basketball practice will be started immediately when the new semester opens.

The physical condition of girls entering the university this year is much better than for several years, according to the statistics made out in the physical education department.

Of the two hundred and fifty-four girls examined and recorded it was only necessary to excuse ten from gymnasium work on account of physical disabilities.

In Other Days

1901.

The students of the university attest, at convocation, their desire to retain Coach Booth. A rising vote was taken at the instance of Chancellor Andrews.

1902.

Proprietors of carriage lines in Lincoln combine to raise the rates on hacks used by students. The Pan-Hellenic congress immediately issues a boycott on them and the war is on.

1908.

Nebraska's stock judging team scored second place among fifteen contesting teams at the International Stock show at Chicago. This is the first team that Nebraska has entered in a stock judging contest.

1911.

Governor Aldrich says that the tuition in the professional schools of the university is too high.

1912.

Announcement is made that Purdy, all-Missouri valley halfback, will head the team for the coming year.
