## LAW COLLEGE OPENS DOORS

CLASSES IN THE COLLEGE OF LAW EXCUSED AFTER TEN O'CLOCK TODAY.

## PROMINENT SPEAKERS SECURED

Ex-Dean Roscoe Pound, Now at Harvard, Chief Justice Reese and Others Will Speak at Dedication.

There will be no school for the law students today after 10 o'clock, according to Dean Engberg. All other students will attend their classes as prescribed while the College of Law will dedicate the new building which bears its name. Last night the members of the college held a big dance as a starter of the dedication ceremony.

The dedication program begins at 10 o'clock and an excellent list of speakers have been secured, all of them men who are interested in the welfare and progress of the College of Law at the University of Nebraska. The principal speakers on the program are Dr. Roscoe Pound, ex-dean of the College of Law, now occupying the Storey chair of law at Harvard; Prof. George B. Costigan, also ex-dean of the College of Law and at present a member of the faculty of the law department of Northwestern university; Regent C. S. Allen, Chief Justice Reese of the supreme court of Nebraska, Dean Hastings, present dean of the College of Law, and Rev. S. Mills Hayes, pastor of the Holy Trinity church of Lincoln.

Ex-Dean Pound is being entertained by the Acacias while Professor Costigan is at Dean Hastings' home.

## ALL GIVE STRONG PROMISE

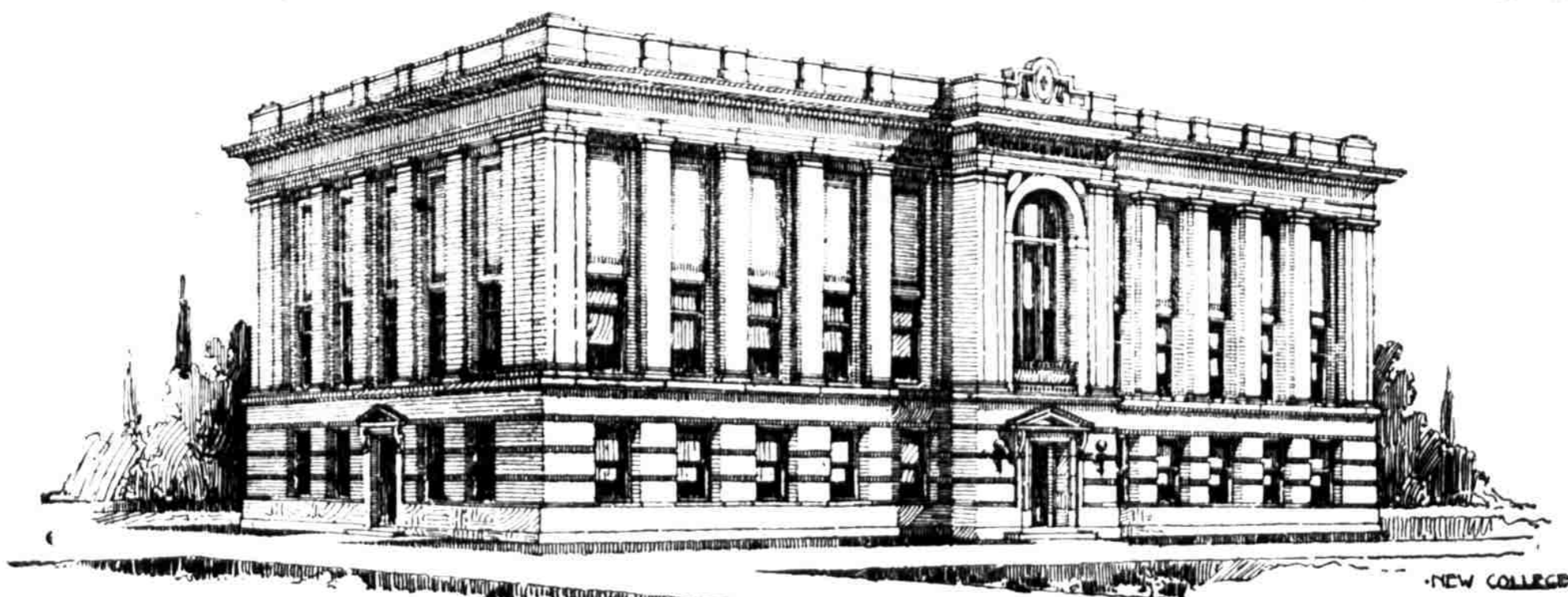
Commendation Coming From All Quarters Leads to Belief They May be Good.
