SALVAGE.

The wreck of the senior class, dashed against the rocks of the Junior-Senior Prom last year and sunk in the waters of Lost Credit, is in the process of being raised. The wreck is to be covered with bonds, inflated with the money of loyal classmen, and salvaged by the end of this week. Class credit will again be established, and most important, the class will be permitted to dance.

The men and women of the upper class are face to face with a crisis which can be met on a strict business basis. The details of the plan of salvage, briefly, provide for the selling of dollar bonds, same to be redeemed if the class treasury ends the year with a surplus. In other words, upon the help of the seniors this week, and the financial administration of class events for the rest of the year, depends the success of the plan.

This is a businesslike manner of dealing with a class debt by university students. The result of it will be watched with interest by businessmen, who are interested in such things as student credit, as well as by the underclassmen.

The duty of every senior is clear. The business honor of the class rests upon each individual, not upon the "class."

The University of Notre Dame football team claims to be in a class by itself this year in matter of mileage traveled. On November 1 it went east to beat the Army at West Point, went home and then returned east to defeat Penn State at State College, Pa., six days later. The team played in St. Louis Saturday and went to Austin, Tex., to meet the University of Texas, southwestern champions. Without including numerous short trips, it is estimated the team covered a total of nearly 5,000 miles this season.

Kansas sentiment toward keeping Coach Mosse to pilot the football team of next season was crystallized Wednesday at a special K. U. Fair-Play Day. Chancellor Strong vigorously protested against the anti-Mosse feeling, and the applause of his student audience indicated that Mosse's efforts for the team were not underestimated. "Keep Mosse, let him choose his assistant for next year, and then hold him responsible for the team," was Chancellor Strong's advice.
