ATHLETIC SOCIETY FOUNDED.

Sigma Delta Psi, an athletic fraternity, has been recently formed at Indiana University to encourage the physical development of college students. In accordance with its design of becoming the althletic counterpart of the academic honor societies the fraternity is about to install chapters in Yale, Stanford and other universities in addition to the following colleges already members: Minnesota, Maine, Indiana, Butler, Hanover, Wabash and Whitman.

Candidates for membership must meet thirteen requirements, which include ability to swim 100 yards without resting, throw a baseball 250 feet and punt a football at least forty yards. Accoring to a report but twenty-six per cent of the contestants failed to qualify last year.

Few More Signers Needed.
