THE FORUM

The Nebraskan Does Not Necessarily Endorse the Sentiments Expressed in This Column

To the Editor of The Daily Nebraskan: There comes a time in the career of the successful and progressive business man when he must change or expand the supporting elements of his business to conform with the more advanced and up-to-date ideas of the times. If he persists on remaining in the same old rut he is soon classed as a "back number" and his business prestige is soon on a rapid decline.

The "Rag" is at the present time facing some such condition. Not necessarily is it synonymous to a business enterprise, as such an enterprise is usually thought of, but essentially it is a parallel to one. This university is rapidly growing in size and prestige and what part of a university better portrays its spirit and progressiveness than the publication which officially represents it. Although the present publication is a very creditable one, any movement which has as its purpose the advancement and betterment of the paper should be heartily encouraged. The increased cost of publication and the resulting increase in the subscription price seems to be about the only boog-a-boo" standing in the way of a change for such a betterment, but the Michigan Daily, a five-column publication of the University of Michigan costs but two dollars and fifty cents per year and is delivered to the subscribers' door week days and Sundays. If they can do it in Michigan we can do it here in Nebraska.

I take it that an exchange of university publications is carried on between those colleges which, by virtue of their geographical positions are bound together by common interests and a university paper goes far in establishing in the minds of its readers the status of the university which it represents. Nebraska has taken the lead in athletics and shown her superiority on the forensic platform, and it is indeed time that the official representative of the student body, its daily paper, should stride into the pace which has been set, and be put on a par with the daily publications of Michigan and other midwestern institutions.

Let's get out of the rut!
