Famous Troupe of Actors to Give Outdoor Performance on Country Club Grounds.

Arrangements have just been made by the Country Club for a series of open air performances to be given in the Spring by the Ben Greet Woodland players. This is the famous organization which has appeared on the campus of every college and university in this country, on the grounds of the White House, and most of the exclusive country clubs.

This is the "number one" company of twenty-eight people and Ben Greet himself, who appears at every performance. There is no entertainment which combines so many delightful features as that of an open air performance. Incidental music is rendered by a string quartet and by choruses of male voices.
