**DEBATE TEAM TO MALCOLM**

TWO UNIVERITIES TEAMS COMBAT EACH OTHER IN STATE TONIGHT.

**CROWDED HOUSE NOW ASSURED**

Debate is Merely in Nature of an Exhibition, not Competitory nor to be Decided

The two debating teams that represented the university in the recent encounters with Minnesota and Iowa the results of which was the double victory for the Huskers will journey to Malcolm, Nebr. tonight. The teams will hold a match debate there on the question on which they went before the judges in the inter-collegiate encounters. "Resolved that immigration into the United States should be further restricted by means of the literacy test." The debate will be under the auspices of the Malcolm Literary society which organization has assured the debaters that a packed house will greet them on this their first appearance in that city.

The teams will leave at six o'clock for the scene of the encounter and will return immediately after the debate. Those who will make the trip are, Affirmative team, Hewett '15, Dawson, '14, Prince, '13, law '15, these men were the ones that constituted the team that defeated Minnesota on the local floor. The Negative team will be composed of, Good, '13 Amherst, law '16, who was alternate on the affirmative team and who will speak in the place of Kirk, the latter being unable to take the trip; Sorenson, '13, law '16, and Schwab, '16 alternate on the negative team and speaking in the place of Perrin.

The idea of the debating team taking such a trip is a decided innovation, being the first time that anything of the sort was ever attempted at the school. The debaters will profit by the trip, in that they will gain by the appearance before such an audience and also in the practice afforded by such match debate.

**Postpone Their Dance.**

any great diminution in the cost of public education to the taxpayers. Some students may be educated at two years in college; others at three, and still others at four; some students may be educated at twenty, others at twenty-two, and still others at twenty-five. But the fact is that no matter how long it takes each particular student to equip himself for his life work, just so long as the state remains in the business of giving education to all who apply for it, just so long will the expense of maintaining the university be a daily burden upon the tax payer. It must appear obvious to anyone who is at all given to a critical examination of the facts that while the length of college course may be a matter of pedagogical concern, it has no effect whatever on the ultimate burden sustained by the tax payer.

Now what are the facts? What is the cost of educating each student at the University of Nebraska? Surely the questioner does not include the cost of university improvements in his guess at the expense of university education; for the buildings, entirely aside from their educational value, are an asset in the hands of the state. Neither can he include in his error the federal grant, the laboratory fees, and the cost of keeping up the various university special activities,—such as the agricultural experiment station, the conservation commission, the entomological bureau, the manufacture of hog cholera serum and a half dozen others,—all of which are for the benefit of the industrial people of the state, all of which are connected with the university only because the university is the place having the experts required to run them, and none of which form a necessary part of the equipment which the taxpayers must furnish for the education of university students. So that the tax payer's only burden for the purpose of higher education is the amount spent for university maintenance, exclusive of improvements and exclusive of special activities, a little over 70 cents a day, which is fairly, honestly and legitimately all that the taxpayer can be said to put up each day for the education of each student at the University of Nebraska.
