THE INJUNCTION

The Daily Nebraskan is still here. After losing one issue to satisfy the whims of Mr. Kuhl we again make our bow to the public. And, by the way, we still have our printing done by the Western Newspaper Union. We are not seriously considering any change voluntary or otherwise. No, Mr. Kuhl, we are very well satisfied where we are. We are going to plug right along without another interruption.

Along this line, did it ever occur to you that almost every other college daily is printed in its own print shop? And we have to worry along with printers' injunctions, charges of unfairness in letting contracts, inconveniences without number. Why don't we have our own shop? Such a plant would print not only the Daily Nebraskan, but all college publications; the catalogue, the bulletins, the various departmental publications, etc. Besides this, it would afford good employment for many students, and teach them a useful trade the while. And, in the meantime, we would never lose an issue in an injunction suit, and the University would never be taken to account for alleged unfairness in letting printing contracts. We want a University printing plant.

Good bye, and good luck to you. We of the University appreciate the work you have done for us, the improved methods you have brought into your department. We are sorry to see you go. But if that must be, then we wish you all the success in the world. May you always succeed as you have in the service of the University.

POLITICS.

It shall not be our purpose at this time to argue for or against the justice of the "machine" in politics. All we wish to say is this: Vote. We want every man and woman in the University to vote today. It is fair that a part of the class—sometimes

relatively small—should elect the officers for the whole class? Don't you wish to exercise your right to vote? There will be plenty of men, and perhaps a few women, who will be more than glad to see you safely to the polls and perhaps tell you which is the better fitted for this or that office. You may do as you like in taking their advice. But, whatever the decision, vote.

We have printed today a list of the candidates and their activities, organizations, etc. This is by no means an infallible index to the fitness of these men, but if you know none of them, it may afford at least one standard of measurement. We have heard some little criticism to the effect that the Daily Nebraskan has been unfair in its announcement of candidates. If such has been true—and this we most sincerely doubt—it has been the result rather of negligence than of intent. We are not boosting anybody. It is for you, the students, to decide between these men. What we try to do is to tell you what we know about them, to help you in your choice. This we have tried to do fairly, impartially.

IN THE "COOP."

Two University students were arrested and hurried away to the police station last Thursday night as a result of a "bawling out" the boys gave some of their friends downstairs. This is but a single instance of the sort of thing University boys have come to stand for in the eyes of the theatre-going public. They interrupt the performance with catcalls and boos; they make life miserable for the college man on the first floor; they monopolize the attention of all. The people of Lincoln are disposed to look upon the college boys as a set of hoodlums, from whom such is to be expected as a matter of course. But even they are growing disgusted. A limited amount of this, a few songs, a few yells between acts, wouldn't offend. But go to the Oliver the next time a musical comedy comes and judge for yourself. Do you think it is altogether proper? We don't. We want the "rough stuff" left out. Don't you?
