Nebraska has made 102 more goals from field than her ten opponents, or 94 points.

The poorest work of the Stiehm quintet is in the matter of free throws. Out of 60 chances they have succeeded in caging the ball but 21 times. This is about as poor a showing as could be expected. If goals from field were to be considered, the Huskers would be winning about 3 to 1.

METHODISTS OFF 1914 FOOTBALL SCHEDULE

Wesleyan Suffers as a Result of Her Coach's Folly—How It All Happened.

Mr. Kline (previous reputation unknown), now a freshman law at Nebraska in the mornings and coach of athletics at Wesleyan during the rest of the day, has killed Wesleyan's chances for a football game with the Cornhuskers in 1914. Last fall Mr. Kline was given a place on the Nebraska schedule. Wesleyan played a fair game for a minor college, received her money and hit the street cars for University Place, happy over the touchdown that she had made upon a fluke.

A few days ago Coach Stiehm made a flat offer to Wesleyan for a 1914 date. The amount offered was nearly twice as large as the amount they received last fall. To the utter dismay of the Nebraska management, the offer was turned down. They wanted a flat guarantee two and one-half times the one offered, or nearly five times their share of the 1913 gate, which was on the 50 per cent basis.

But the funny part is yet to be told. They either demanded the excessive guarantee or proposed that the game be played out in their back yard. Now have you ever seen Wesleyan's

field? It has one grandstand which, when crowded, is capable of holding about 200 people. Think of the nerve it took to ask the Cornhuskers to do a stunt like that. What would Chicago do if Knox should suggest that the Maroons play in Galesburg? What would Wisconsin say if Beloit should ask the Badgers down to their field? What would Harvard say to Tufts? Well, if you don't know, take an athletic guide and look up where the big schools play their practice games.

Nebraska has had many games with Doane and yet a search through the records failed to show where their gall bladder had sprung a leak. Peru has never imagined herself other than what she is; Kearney has never suffered from hallucinations, and yet both schools had been given games on Nebraska field.

Nebraskans, however, need not worry. The Cornhuskers will play neither in University Place nor Podunk. They will have an eight-game schedule, six of which will be on Nebraska field.

The student body at Nebraska will be sorry to learn of the dropping of Wesleyan. Perhaps in another year Wesleyan may be granted a date. If they are, it will be on Nebraska field. If they are favored with a contract at any future period it will not only be on Nebraska field, but the guarantee will be as liberal as the Wesleyan game would permit, and no more.

K. U. AND NEBRASKA MAY CONTEST TITLE

Basketball Prospects Practically Eliminate the Other Valley Teams.

Basketball, just now the important sport in the Missouri Valley Conference, is well under way and the schedules have been played through far enough to give a line on the merits of the respective teams.

Nebraska and Kansas loom up as the logical contenders for the title. The Cornhuskers, fresh from a victorious football season, started out well by defeating a few small colleges and then beat Minnesota, 21 to 15, Friday night. Their first Conference clash comes next Friday, when they play Drake at Lincoln, Nebr. Kansas has played six Conference games, losing one. The Jayhawkers took two each from Ames and Washington and broke even with their compatriots, the Kansas Aggies. They meet the Tigers in Columbia tomorrow and Thursday.

Ames, Drake, Washington, Missouri and the Kansas Aggies are left to hold the sack, unless one of them makes a remarkable spurt before long. Ames seems to have lost to every team they have played, except Drake, and they have not yet met Washington. As for Drake, according to their Daily Delphic, its team "almost succeeded in winning from Ames." And this "almost" team meets Nebraska Friday night. Washington has played four Conference games, losing three. Kansas smothered them twice and Missouri scratched out ahead of them once.

The Tigers are the worst handicapped of the lot. Having lost two of their best men right at the top of the season, the Tigers bid fair to limp along the remainder, completely out of the race. They beat Ames twice, when the regular team was in the game, broke even with Washington, and are to play Kansas this week. The Kansas Aggies hold the record of having whipped the Jayhawkers one game
