NEBRASKA WRESTLERS TO MEET TEXAS GRAPPLERS

Football With South Dakota—Ganz Injured—Basketball Team Off Feed.

Coach Stiehm this morning will meet the football manager of the University of South Dakota. The conference will take place at the Lincoln Hotel. It is quite possible that this meeting will result in placing South Dakota on the Nebraska 1914 football schedule.

Captain Carl Ganz of the wrestling team is nursing an infected arm. Those who attended the Iowa-Nebraska match Saturday night remember that Ganz's right forearm was bandaged. Yesterday, while the injured member was being dressed, the writer saw the worst case of infection he has ever seen. There are five open wounds between the elbow and the wrist. Four of these are larger than a silver dollar. How Captain Ganz was able to use his arm at all last Saturday night is a marvel. It goes without saying that he must have suffered intensely. When asked how he managed to wrestle with his arm in such a condition, he answered, "It didn't hurt much after I got warmed up, but it kept me from using any dramatic gestures in the junior-senior debate."

Final arrangements have been made for a dual wrestling meet with the University of Texas. The matches will be pulled off in Texas. Only three men will make the trip. Glen Ruby, the star of the 1911 and 1912 teams, has announced that he is again going to try out. This gives a decided boost to the Cornhuskers' chances.

"Mike" Hyland has been secured to referee the games tonight and Saturday evening between Ames and Nebraska.

Coach Stiehm complains that the Huskers are off feed. From an announcement like this, changes may be expected in the lineup tonight.

The probable weights for the dual wrestling meet with Texas will be: Lightweight, 132 or 133 pounds; light welterweight, 140 or 142 pounds, and welterweight, 158 pounds.

DRAKE-NEBRASKA LONG DISTANCE MEET

Nebraska Wins on the Shot-Put and Makes Good Average in the 25-Yard Dash.

Prospects are better than ever in regard to the Correspondence Track Meet which is being carried on with Drake. The men are still turning out well and some very good work has resulted. The plan of taking the average of the thirty best marks is carried out throughout the entire meet. The second event, the shot-put, placed Nebraska on a level with Drake. The averages were: Nebraska, 35 feet 7 inches; Drake, 35 feet 2 inches. The 25-yard dash has been run here, but the average made at Drake has not yet been received. Drake is compelled to go out-of-doors for this event and the weather has not yet permitted such action. Nebraska's average in the 25-yard dash is 37/15 seconds. This is very good and practically cinches this event for us. According to the schedule, some of the sprints should have been run off by this time, but the inclement weather has interfered. As soon as the weather will permit the work will be continued on the track. Every man who has ever worn trunks is urged to come out and show what he is worth, not only for the good of the University, but for his own personal benefit.

A Million Years Old.

Glen Ruby of the Geography department has received a section of petrified wood from eastern Iowa. It was discovered in a coal mine 160 feet below the surface, in a deposit of glacial drift. It belongs to the pine species and is estimated by Professor Barbour and other authorities to be 1,000,000 years old. A portion is on exhibition in the Geography and Geology departments.
