LIME FOR LAYING HENS.

Lime in the ration of the laying hen is very important, says the poultry department of the University of Nebraska. She must have the material with which to build the egg shell—without it production is greatly impaired.

PRUNING DEMONSTRATION.

Farmers who wish instruction in pruning their orchards may secure the service of a horticulturist from the agricultural extension service of the University of Nebraska. If six farmers in one community indicate a desire to receive such instruction and promise to attend a pruning demonstration, an extension specialist will be sent to show exactly how the work is done.

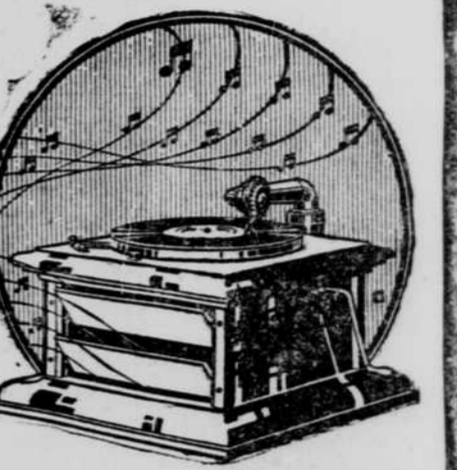
