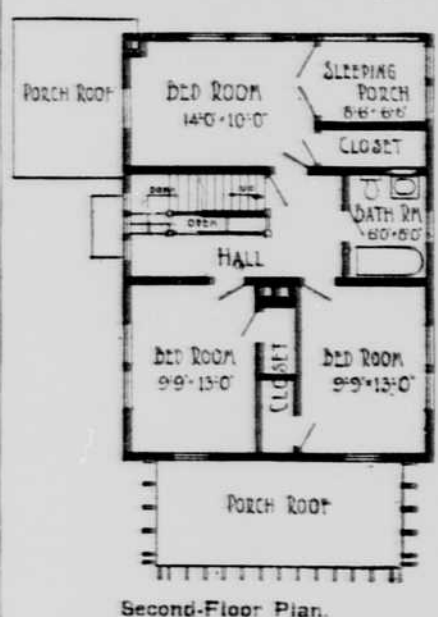

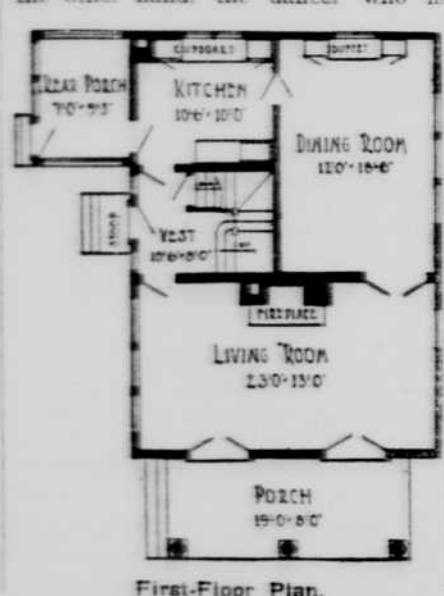

ANOTHER ANTI-CIGARET BILL

Items of General Interest Gathered from Reliable Sources Around the State House

Western Newspaper Union News Service. Passage of the Richmond bill for a new east wing of the state capitol, by the lower branch of the legislature is now a foregone conclusion.

Senate is Hardest Worker.

While the senate has pluggled along in a leisurely way, it has really accomplished more toward the making of laws than has the house, according to statistics compiled by Senate Book-keeper Gus Beschner.

Another Anti-Cigaret Bill

Still another anti-cigarette bill has been placed on the general file in the house and will be submitted to the sifting committee.

Legislative League Banquet

A feast of mingled mirth, sentiment and historical reminiscences unprecedented in legislative annals, is scheduled for the annual reunion of the Nebraska Legislative League.

Say Figures Disprove Statement.

While charges have been made that appropriations of the 1915 legislature exceeded \$9,800,000 and increased amazingly over the appropriations of the 1913 session, figures given out by the state assessment board show that but \$6,300,000 was raised from the taxpayers for the biennium of 1915 and 1916.

Taking Precautions Against Fire

That the state capital may be prepared for any unforeseen fire, Governor Neville has ordered all the fire apparatus in the building thoroughly cleaned and tested.

Wants Western Soldiers.

"I would have more soldiers about me who are from the good old rugged homestead country of western Nebraska," said Adjutant General Phil Hall.

It is charged that the sifting committee as proposed in the upper house would contain only one prohibitionist. If that is true, say the dregs at the other end of the capitol, there may be some grounds for an Omaha liquor merchant's going on the assumption that the people will be allowed to stock up their wine cellars prior to May 1.

IS SELF-SUPPORTING

Penitentiary Light Plant Furnishes Other State Institutions

Charging each state institution for the electric light service which its penitentiary power plant provides is the plan of the state board of control for putting that plant on a self-supporting basis.

The service lights the Lincoln hospital for the insane, Orthopedic hospital, the capitol building, the governor's mansion, the home for dependent children, in addition to the penitentiary itself.

Vouchers have just passed through the hands of the state auditor showing that the hospital for the insane has paid out \$3,457.26 for service since April 1, 1916.

Under the new plan, the board of control has asked the legislature to reduce the penitentiary appropriation about \$20,000 for the biennium on the ground that the power plant can pay its own keep.

Some Nebraska Auto Figures

More than \$12,000,000 a year is spent in Nebraska just to run the automobiles owned in this state, while more than \$70,000,000 is invested in the machines on which this money is spent.

There were 100,534 registered in 1916. At an average value of \$700 the total value is \$70,373,800.

An average upkeep cost of \$50 a car would amount to \$5,026,700 for all of them.

At an average of 20 cents a gallon the gasoline cost \$8,042,720.

A parade of all the cars, owned in Nebraska, would string out for 312 miles.

Govs Back to State Fund.

Governor Neville has sent a special message to the legislature in response to the Swedish resolution inquiring why no refund had been paid into the state guarantee fund from the assets of the First State Savings bank of Superior.

Appropriations for Specific Purposes

State Auditor Smith has notified various boards interested that the legislature proposes to appropriate fees for the use of the boards collecting them, but that it proposes also to designate the purpose for which fees shall be expended, and how much for each purpose.

There is some opposition to this method on the ground that in the case of some boards it is difficult to estimate in advance how much will be needed for traveling expenses or for any other purpose, and the legislature is likely to appropriate too much or too little for different purposes.

Preparedness for National Guard

Adjutant General Phil Hall of the National guard has received orders from the war department which indicated a desire on the part of the department to be alert for any possible grave developments in the international situation.

"We are ready to send 1,600 men out of the state on forty-eight hours' notice," declared General Hall.

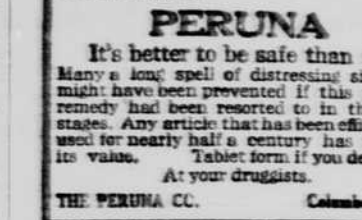
Measures to prevent 'monopoly control' of farm products are recommended to the legislature in a report filed by the special committee appointed early in the session.

Chief Clerk Potts started to read it, but the house grew restive after ten or fifteen minutes and an effort was made to sidetrack the document.

By a vote of 58 to 38, the house, in committee of the whole Tuesday afternoon, ordered to a third reading the bill appropriating \$7,100,000 of one mill for the purpose of building a new east wing for the state capitol.
