I would advise party wanting binders this year or in the next three years, to buy them this year. A seven ft. Deering binder complete will cost you \$175. This same binder in 1918 will cost you \$225 or more which would be 8 per cent interest on \$175 to August 1, 1921. If you buy a binder now and give your note at 8 per cent interest until August 1, 1921, it would be cheaper than buying at that time, while you have the use of the binder for three years in case of a large wheat crop in 1918 it will be impossible to furnish half the demand for binders. Buy your binder this year and save from \$50 to \$60 and be sure to have one for the 1918 crop.
