TIME TO "COME CLEAN."

It is time for every man and woman who lives under the American flag to "come clean." The Irishman who hates England more than he loves the United States needs a rejuvenation of his patriotism. The citizen of German birth or parentage who wavers for a minute in his allegiance to the Stars and Stripes because he sympathizes with Germany, needs to have hammered into his brains a realization of the blessings he has been privileged to enjoy because he is not now a citizen of Germany. The man who sneaked out upon a farm in order to increase his chances of exemption by registering as a farmer, needs to be the first one grabbed by the recruiting authorities. It is high time for people of the

middle west to wake up to the fact that we are at war with Germany, and that the minute any man wavers in his allegiance, that minute he should be arrested as an enemy.

We are not at war with the German represented by Schiller and Goethe; not at war with the Germany of Ziszi and Beethoven; not at war with the Germany of Schurz and Altgeld, or the master painter Reubens—we are at war with the Germany represented by the red-handed murderers whose orders caused the murder of Edith Cavell, slaughtered innocent women and children on the Lusitania, caused the violation of all laws of humanity by dropping bombs upon non-combatants and resorted to poison gas and poisoned wells. We are at war with the Germany whose monarch, insane with ambition, broke all traditions of national honesty by violating solemn treaties and excusing himself on the ground that treaties are "but scraps of paper." We are at war with the Germany that held out to us the hand of pretended friendship while hiring assassins to stab us in the back; with the Germany that hesitated at no intrigue, hesitated at no diabolical plot to blow up factories and murder innocent men and women. We are not at war with the Germany of art and music, but with the Germany that violated the women of Belgium, emasculated little Belgian boys by the thousands and sowed the devastation of death in order to terrorize with the thoughts of German vengeance and German culture.

It is high time that we realize the horrible fact that the Germany of the Hoenzollerns is a Germany of insane ambitions, bloody lust, conscienceless greed and heartless ferocity; the Germany that would foist the rule of absolute monarchs and destroy the seeds of democracy. We may sympathize with a people forced to do the will of an insane, bloody-bessotted kaiser, but there must be no more paltering with men and women in this land who hold the slightest sympathy with the Germany of Wilhelm and Bernstoff and Von Hindenberg. Every resource of this great republic, of men and of money, must be drawn upon to administer to kingly ambition and insane ego in the person of the kaiser such a crushing defeat that never again in the world's history shall his peace be threatened by a moral pervert who reckons not of humanity.

It is time for every man and woman living under the Stars and Stripes to "come clean." The possession of a "hyphen" should be prima facie evidence of treason, and failure to speak out in support of the principles represented by the flag should be deemed sufficient to brand him who so fails as lacking in the elements that make an American citizen.—York Democrat.

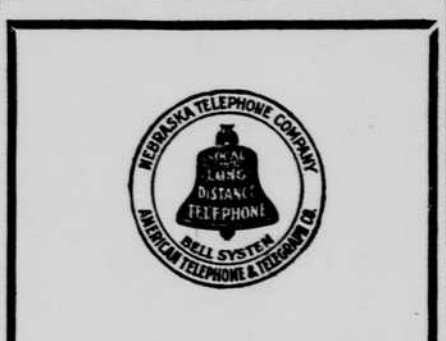
