Hon. H. M. Sinclair has been more than successful in his race for the nomination for district judge on the republican ticket. In the convention held last Tuesday at Ravenna he was chosen on first ballot, the vote standing as follows:

The convention was harmonious. Both Mr. Wall and Mr. Gutterson, the elected candidates made speeches praising their support to the ticket. The convention had a large attendance outside of the regular delegates and everybody seemed to be enthusiastic for Sinclair. He is without doubt the strongest candidate in the district and if elected will make us a good judge as his past record clearly attests.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED AT THE REPUBLICAN COUNTY CONVENTION HELD AT LOUP CITY SEPT. 14th 1895.

Resolved that we endorse the past principals of the republican party and affirm the history it has made.
That we favor the unlimited coinage of the American product of both gold and silver at a fair and honest ratio, and condemn as un-American and un-politic any policy tending toward the repudiation either for that or otherwise of any obligation whether private or public and the issue of fiat money in any form whatsoever.

We fearlessly denounce the present democratic administration for its senseless prostration of the business prospects of our great country, the shameful depletion of our treasury and the ruinous debt creating policy of Cleveland and his democratic cabinet. We challenge attention to the history of the past republican administration which maintained such a financial equilibrium in the whole of our country that the people felt safe and satisfied while in the possession of either gold silver or greenbacks, and that democracy alone is responsible for the destruction of that confidence.

Resolved: That we condemn the policy of this administration for collecting more funds by direct internal taxation than from custom duties and for repealing the statutes passed by republican congresses which enabled the government to collect a greater amount from custom duties than from internal taxation.

Resolved: That we condemn the action of the democratic party in its total disregard of the interests of the laboring classes of this nation, and its legislation in behalf of corporate interests and aggregated wealth at every opportunity given it to do so.

Resolved: That we ever distrust a party or a government that have been unfaithful to the soldiers which have borne arms in its defense, and we condemn the shameful wholesale reduction of the pension of indigent veterans and their needy families by the party now temporarily in power.

RECORDED

The following special appeared in the State Journal of Sept. 17th, and is conceded by the best men of Holt county to be purely the result of Anarchy talk made by populist leaders. It should serve as a warning to others, even of our own county where populist leaders have been known to mount the stump and talk of resorting to fire arms and even giving a recipe for making dynamite.

O'NEIL, Neb. Sept. 16th (Special).—The vigilants of the northeast part of the county are again growling. They want more blood. Last week Jim Binkard received a letter warning him to leave the county or suffer death in a manner illustrated by pen upon the margin. The idea was to raise his body and through the opportunity afforded by gravitation to take the slack out of a rope. The letter was mailed at Inman and told him to leave the country immediately or he would go the way of those that had gone before.

The offence committed by Mr. Binkard was too loud denunciation of the men who murdered Barrett Scott. Jim Binkard is a courageous man and well accustomed to the vicissitudes of frontier life, and did not intend to pay any attention to the matter, but his family got hold of it and became so thoroughly frightened that he decided to leave for the present, and accordingly took his departure Sunday morning for Iowa. It is his intention to return after a sojourn, if the republicans are successful in local affairs. He says that he is not afraid to live on the river under a republican administration, but with the populists in control, and by their sympathy aiding and abetting such work, he considers himself safer elsewhere.

Mr. Binkard lives in a strong populist community, and lost favor among them. The morning he left about a dozen of them called to bid him farewell, and were most bitter in their denunciation of the vigilants and threatened him that they had cast their last pop vote, that they were through voting for a condition of affairs that was driving their friends and neighbors out of the country.

Several other republicans have received letters but have refused to depart. Prominent among them is John Mensie. When he received his notice he quietly hitched up his team and came to O'Neil and had his life insured for the benefit of his family and returning home sent word to the vigilants that he was ready to balance accounts at any time and place.
