THE COUNTY CONVENTION.

Loup City, Sept. 14th, 1895.
 Pursuant to call the Republican County Convention met at the Court House at Loup City, Sherman County, Nebr.
 The call was read by Central Committeeman W. H. Brown.
 On motion W. H. Brown was elected temporary chairman, John Mathewson, Sec. and C. W. Gibson, Assistant Sec.
 On motion it was carried that the chairman appoint a committee on credentials, permanent organization and order of business.
 Committee on credentials—E. Munn, Fred Schupp and Dr. Palmer.
 Committee on resolutions—F. W. Tate, C. E. Achenback and A. Wall.
 Committee on order of business—W. H. Conger, S. J. Fair and J. G. Cressler.
 Committee on permanent organization—T. C. Chamberlain, G. W. Holmes and Doc Robertson.
 On motion it was carried to adjourn until 2 o'clock p. m.
 Convention re-assembled at 2 p. m. Committee on permanent organization recommended that the temporary organization be made permanent. On motion their report was adopted and committee discharged.
 Committee on credentials made a report that the credentials were all correct. On motion the report was adopted as read and committee discharged.
 Committee on order of business recommended the following:—1st—election of delegates to State Convention;—2nd election of delegates to Judicial convention.
 For the nomination of county officers the following order was recommended, Clerk, Treasurer, Sheriff, Judge, Superintendent, Coroner and Surveyor. To this an amendment was offered, placing treasurer before clerk and surveyor before coroner. The amendment was adopted and committee discharged.
 Report of committee on resolutions read and adopted and committee discharged.
 The following were elected delegates to State Convention:—F. W. Tate, E. Munn, F. W. Fuller, S. J. Fair and Ed F. Chinn.
 Moved and seconded that Dr. Palmer be nominated a delegate to the Judicial Convention, amended that Judge Wall name the delegates to the convention; carried. The following were chosen: H. R. Palmer, W. H. Brown, John Cressler, W. H. Conger and W. A. Wilson.
 F. W. Fuller was nominated for County Treasurer. There being only one nomination for Co. Treasurer, by motion the rules were suspended and F. W. Fuller was chosen by a unanimous vote of the convention.
 On motion it was carried that an informal ballot be taken for Co. Clerk. On the 4th formal ballot H. M. Bates receiving the majority of votes cast was nominated Clerk.
 On motion it was carried to take an informal ballot for Sheriff which brought in nomination Ormsby, Crawford, Cressler and Bissell. On first formal ballot Bissell received the majority of votes of convention, and was declared nominee for Sheriff.
 G. H. Scott was nominated for County Judge. On motion it was carried that the rules be suspended and G. H. Scott be nominated by acclamation.
 On motion it was carried to proceed to an informal ballot for Co. Supt. On first formal ballot D. E. Mowery receiving the majority of votes cast was nominated Co. Supt. Walter A. Moon was unanimously nominated for Co. Surveyor.
 On motion it was carried that the rules be suspended and that Mrs. Dr. Hendrickson be nominated Coroner.
 Moved and seconded that if Mr. Wall be defeated in the Judicial Convention, that Sainclair is the second choice of this convention. Amended that the delegates go uninstructed, amendment carried.
 On motion M. H. Mead was elected County Central Committeeman.
