DIED.—On May 9th, 1896 at one o'clock a. m. of old age at the home of his only daughter, Mrs. H. Smelser, at Ashton, Nebraska. William L. Wilson, at the age of 81 years. He was born in Alleghany county, Pa., in 1815 and during his life time resided in Indiana and for many years at Plattville, Wis. He married Anna Himan while residing in Indiana, and there was born to them five sons and three daughters, of whom he left surviving him the following: R. A. Wilson in business at Cuba City, Wis.; W. A. Wilson farmer and stock raiser Ashton, Neb.; J. H. Wilson in business at Plattville, Wis.; T. D. Wilson farmer at Ashton, Neb.; Geo. E. Wilson farmer at Richmond, Oklahoma; Mrs. Emma Smelser, wife of H. Smelser banker and capitalist at Ashton Neb. Mr. W. L. Wilson had been prior to his death for over 40 years a consistent member of the Presbyterian church. He came to Sherman county in 1830 and passed his time in visiting around among his children, his wife having died some years before he left Plattville, Wis. He had a most vigorous constitution, and bright and intellectual mind which remained clear almost to the close. He was a patriot, and ever had the best interests at heart. He was an affectionate husband and father. For some months preceding his decease, his vital powers commenced to fail and during the past two weeks to such an extent that his decease had been almost daily expected. He died surrounded by loving kindfolk and friends whom he seemed to recognize by the presence of his hand when speech had failed. He desired his remains to be taken to Plattville, Wis. and buried with those of the family who had gone before. His remains were embalmed and according to his wish removed to Plattville, Wis. accompanied by his sons R. A. Wilson and W. A. Wilson, and his daughter Mrs. Smelser, Monday last. DECORATION DAY. Shiloh Post No. 124 G. A. R. assisted by Shiloh Circle No. 5, Ladies G. A. BY ORDER OF COM. Buried in a Well. News reached here last Saturday evening of the sad fate of Harry Hughes who was buried alive by the caving in of a well while he was at work cleaning it out. As near as we can learn at this writing the well in question was located on a farm about 10 miles south of North Loup and about 15 miles east of this city and was of a depth of 125 feet. It seems that after the first cave in an attempt at rescue was made. Nothing but his hands which seemed to be raised upwards could be seen. Soon after this another tremendous pile of earth gave way and he was buried so deep that all efforts to rescue him alive was at once despaired of. Further examination proved it necessary to curb the well from top to bottom in order to make it safe for any one to go down. This was done and a force of men set to work to recover the body. After removing about thirty feet of earth the lifeless remains were found standing upright with both hands uplifted, as if having been warned of the danger, he had made an effort to catch the rope and go out. His body was recovered about 3 o'clock p. m. Monday. He is a single man. The quarterly Sabbath School convention will be held May 31st, at Union church, all are cordially invited to attend.
