Paul's Epistle to the Pops.

Paul Van Der Voort Tells of the Nebraska Sell Out.

St. Louis, July 24.—(To the Editor of the Globe-Democrat.)—I notice in this morning's paper a virulent attack upon me by the Nebraska delegation, signed W. L. Green, chairman, and Worwick Saunders, secretary. I do not believe it was authorized by the decent element on that delegation. W. L. Green is an office holder, and hopes to be nominated for congress and get the democratic endorsement Warwick Saunders is one of Governor Holcomb's oil inspectors. Half of the delegation are Governor Holcomb's appointees who hope to perpetuate their jobs. Gov. Holcomb has made a direct deal with Mr. Bryan to nominate him at St. Louis, and thereby get Bryan's support for governor this fall.

It is a direct and shameless sell-out of the populist party of Nebraska. Senator Ailen has also entered into a deal to be re-elected to the United States senate, as a result of this trade. Over half of these men are office holders, and as such under our rules are not eligible to seats in our convention. They are heard wearing democratic badges, and their leaders are daily conferring with the chairman of the democratic national committee. They have shamelessly sold out the populist party in this state for gain. They came here on railroad passes and packed the convention, by the most shameless and corrupt old party methods. Governor Holcomb's nearest relatives are now on a trip to Alaska as guests of the Union Pacific railroad company. In our state it is well known that Governor Holcomb is under the absolute control of the gold bug editor of the Omaha Bee. He appointed his son to a high office. These people, by sinister influences that will not bear the light, are seeking to destroy the people's party. They wear elegant gilt edge badges. They inhabit magnificent headquarters. They howl and jeer at straight populist delegates. In their earnest desire to stay at the pie counters they slander and malign honest men.

I hold two positions in the populist party, president of the national reform press and commander of the national legion. I have given a pledge on honor that I will stand by our party and protect its honor against the malignant assaults of all traitors who may assail it. I will state by the pledge, no matter what happens. I have no ill will towards Mr. Bryan. He is a good man in bad company. One of the most dangerous of the radical heresies promulgated at Chicago is the attack made on the Federal courts. This is done in three distinct instances. The Supreme Court is directly attacked because of its decision in regard to the income tax; the Federal Circuit Courts are assailed in the Altgeld plank, which incidentally condemns their interference to preserve order at the time of the Chicago riots, and then the platform declares against life tenure in office, which must be aimed at the Federal judiciary, as they constitute the only class of officials in the country who hold office for life.

The money question, however important it may be, is a small matter compared with this proposition to strip the United States Courts of their life tenure. In all the maddening surge of political disturbance that this country has passed through, the Federal courts have constituted a safe and conservative bulwark against revolution. The party that attacks the Federal courts is a dangerous party that no man who wishes to see the Constitution preserved can afford to support.—Daily Journal (East St. Louis), Mo.

In 1892 the Democratic party invited the farmers and manufacturers but specially the farmers, of the United States to vote for "tariff reform," and promised that lower duties would insure larger exportations of American products. They said that foreign commerce is a game of swapping corn for cloth or wheat for jack knives, and they assured the farmer that if he would buy more muslin and hardware from England, England would buy more grain and wheat from him. They neglected to add that if the American farmer bought more goods from Europe and less from American makers the American workman would have less money to spend for food. The protectionists told the farmers that Europe would not buy a dollar's worth more of wheat or meat from America than it "had to," and that it was unlikely that American exports would fall off than increase under a low tariff.

We now have experience by which to test the predictions of the free traders and the protectionists. During four years of protective policy the value of American exports stood as follows:

1890.....	\$845,987,711
1891.....	957,833,557
1892.....	923,237,315
1893.....	854,737,087

In 1894 the Wilson bill tariff took effect and the exports for that year were worth \$807,312,115. In 1895 they were worth \$807,543,982. The average value of "the markets of the world"—which is a high sounding way of speaking of foreign trade—was \$920,324,087 a year during four years of protection. The highest value during two years of lower tariff has been \$807,543,982. That is to say, we have lost at the rate \$112,780,105 a year in value of exports during the operation of the democratic tariff law.
