United press reports show that since McKinley's election 250,000 additional laboring men have already been set to work in the different manufacturing industries of the country. AN APOLOGY.

The Times-Independent said we should apologize to County Clerk Rein for having stated that he practiced deception in the matter of printing the election ballots. All right, here goes:

We are sorry for Mr. Rein and his pal, Eddie Brown, that it should become necessary for them to call upon any one, much less their contemporary to apologize for them, but the fact is they are guilty and they know it. Rein admitted his deceitful intention to us, that he so constructed the ballot to catch the sound money democratic votes for the fusion ticket. The law says that one candidate shall not have any more prominence than another. Now Mr. Rein not only changed the order of candidates but he gave the fusion nominees twice as much space on the ticket all through as he did the rest of the nominees. Not content with this he makes the fusion ticket more prominent by instructing his pal the Times editor, and others of his political persuasion, to tell the voters in all parts of the county to "be sure and mark the 'X' in the wide space." And yet in the face of all this Eddie has the brass to intimate that Mr. Rein carried out the full intention of the law. Having heard that there were some irregularities in the printing of the Howard county ballots, and that the court in consequence compelled them to be reprinted, he boarded the train and went to St. Paul, evidently with fear and trembling. But when he saw the decision of the court he drew a breath of relief and returned home. The fact is that the objection to the Howard county ballot was not made because of the wide space business but because the printing plates broke and a part of the ticket was then narrowed up, and also because some of the candidates were not placed in alphabetical order as the law provided.

We repeat that the work of the construction of our ballots by Louis Rein was a piece of fraud, prompted by the devil and sanctioned by Ed Brown. How do you like the apology?

McKinley's Election All That is Needed To Start Machinery.

HOARDED MONEY TO BE RELEASED.

Millions of Idle Capital Awaiting the Verdict—St. Louis Banks Begin to Pay out Gold on Demand.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 5.—Alexander Brown, head of the banking house of Alexander Brown and sons, who a few days ago was credited with having said that not less than \$16,000,000 was simply awaiting McKinley's election for its investment in industrial enterprises in Maryland, said today:

"Some time ago I stated that \$16,000,000 was ready to invest in this state in the event of McKinley's election. While I cannot give details regarding the transactions involving the money, I can say that it is available and that it will be immediately invested to pulp mills, iron mills various other manufactures and in the promotion and development of the industrial interests of Baltimore and the state, and that thousands of men will be benefited thereby. Capital has confidence and its influence toward the return of general prosperity will soon be felt."

GOLD IS POURING IN.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 5.—More gold is pouring into several of the subtreasury offices than the offices have storage capacity for or have legal tender currency to give in exchange. This is notably the case in Boston. This gold has been brought out for sale deposite vaults by the owners who have been paying storage charges upon it. Baltimore and New York also have large deposits of gold, but how much was deposited at New York could not be stated at the treasury, as the daily telegram had not been received when the department closed. Nothing had been heard from western points. In response to gold deposits the treasury sent out this letter today to the nine assistant treasuries:

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 5.—Assistant Treasurer United States—Sir:—Referring to the instructions communicated to you by my letter of November 23, 1895, authorizing you to receive gold coin in exchange for paper currency I have to say that the department desires to be informed in advance of any large transactions, in order that stores may be taken to accommodate the depositors if the stock of notes and silver certificates available in the cash of this office will admit of the being made. The payment of express charges by the government on remittances of gold to the offices of the treasury and on the currency returned therefore will be discontinued. Gold coin beneath the least currency weight will be received as heretofore in exchange for paper under the regulations still in force. Respectfully, D. N. MORGAN.

Treasurer United States. Revival Has Set In.

NORTH TONAWANDA, N. Y., Nov. 5. One of the biggest demonstrations ever witnessed in Niagara county took place here this afternoon when the Niagra Iron foundry at Ironton was formally opened and 300 additional men given employment at the new plant. The event marks the beginning of an era of prosperity here and it was fittingly celebrated. At 2:30 a procession was formed and preceded by a brass band, marched to the iron works. There the furnaces had been prepared for lighting and promptly at three o'clock President-elect McKinley touched a button in his house at Canton and the electric wire connecting it with the furnace emitted a spark which ignited the infamable material and the new blast furnaces were put in operation. A telephone message was sent to the north side water works where a signal was given by a steam whistle and soon every whistle and fire gong in the city

ring out the glad tidings. The day was observed as a holiday.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 5.—The hardware manufactory of the Sargent company in this city has started up full force. The factory which employed about 2,000 hands, is the largest in the city, if not in the state.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Nov. 5.—The jewelry business here has felt the immediate result of McKinley's election. Several shops this morning posted up notices of a full time schedule.

PAYING OUT GOLD. ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 5.—Gold was paid out on demand at all the St. Louis banks. President Thompson of the National Bank of Commerce said we have ordered our tellers to pay in gold whenever it is asked for. We did this as the result of Mr. McKinley's election. Before the election we dared not, as the demand for gold by those who feared the success of the silver movement would have exhausted our supply.

President Charles Parsons of the state bank said: We are giving out gold now to all who ask for it, because we know gold payments will be kept up by the government. The sixty or eighty million dollars of gold which have been hoarded will come out and go into circulation or be deposited in banks and all reasonable accommodations will be given to manufacturers and merchants.

The Time-Independent says that we have nothing to crow over and speaks of their state victory to support his statement. Now let us see. The facts are that they sold themselves out to the democrats, and consequently it is, so far as Nebraska is concerned, a democratic victory and not a pop victory.
