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The farmer, the merchant, and all men of business and of different professional pursuits should drop politics and settle down to business.

The supervisors of Sherman county have passed a resolution asking senator elect, J. W. Heapy and representative elect, J. M. Snyder to use all honorable means to secure the repeal of the act providing for the extermination of the Russian thistle in this state. This, we believe to be a step in the right direction. When the act was passed, however, men of all politics believed it to be a good law. But it has proven to be a very expensive undertaking, and practically no good has resulted from it. Sherman county has thus far complied strictly with the provisions of this act, and in consequence has been to hundreds of dollars expense. Other counties, we are informed have not done so. The law should be repealed.

If the farmers of Nebraska would turn their attention more to beet sugar raising they would then be producing an article for which we have a home market, and all the profits would not be consumed by freights. Our principle live stock and grain markets are so far away from us that, as producers we cannot realize much after the freight is paid. A home market is the best market in the world, and the nearer we are to it the better. The bounty paid for the manufacture of beet sugar amounts to only five cents per capita. And for this trifling sum you are afforded a market that will enable you to realize a net profit of about \$30.00 per acre every year that you are blessed with good crops. Farmers, give this matter your serious consideration. What we want is a beet sugar factory right here in Sherman county; one that will employ four or five hundred of our men during the winter months, and one that will furnish you this much needed home market.

The "Patriots of America," we understand, are considerably worked up over the exposure they received from this paper last week. And well they might be. It was like throwing a bomb shell into the enemy's camp. The organization is nothing but a scheme gotten up for the purpose of deceitfully and secretly inducing republicans to join them. It is another Farmers Alliance, only that its members are composed more of lawyers and professional office seekers.

When the "Farmers Alliance" was gotten up its members and cabinet officers spoke right out in public for the principles it advocated, although they did not publish the proceeding had in secret meetings, but the "Patriots of America" are using cunning and deceit to gain membership. They tell you "there is no politics in it," when the facts are there is nothing else in it.

A further proof of the political schemes of the "Patriots of America" has just reached us. Just before the election they held a meeting in this city in the Walworth hall and passed a resolution to support Bryan whereupon two of its members got up and left the hall. Oh no, "there is no politics in it."

Next week we will produce a few extracts from the "Patriots Bulletin" which will be interesting reading. Of course there will be "no politics in it."

Supervisors Proceedings.

The following resolution was adopted: The county of Sherman having for the last two years endeavored to comply with section 21 to 36 inclusive, chapter 2 of the completed statutes of 1895 being an act to provide for the destruction of the Russian thistle to prevent its spread, to provide for the collection of expenses incurred thereby and to fix penalties for a violation of this act, and feeling that the law is of no particular benefit to the citizen of Sherman county and that its provisions in spirit and letter are not observed by the adjoining counties and in consequence all the labor performed and expenses incurred by this county in endeavoring to exterminate Russian thistles under the above law, is and has been of no avail and has proved a great expense with no practical benefit to Sherman county of the Citizens thereof. Now therefore be it

Resolved: That we the county Board of Supervisors of Sherman County, Nebraska, in regular session assembled with full knowledge of expenses incurred and benefits received, under said law, hereby request our legislators elect, to wit: J. W. Heapy and J. M. Snyder, to use all their honorable means to secure the repeal of the aforesaid Russian Thistle Law at the next session of the legislature of this state.


