REPUBLICAN CANDIDATES.

To those who know John L. Hopper, the candidate for county clerk on the republican ticket, it is only necessary to announce the fact that he is in the race to secure their support, especially of those who have had business relations with him. But to those who do not know him we simply wish to give a brief announcement as to his character, efficiency and worth as a business man. Mr. Hopper has lived in Loup City since 1886 and during the greater part of the time has been in the elevator business; in fact he has been doing business at different times for both companies, and every year both elevators are anxious to secure him as manager of their business, but of course only the one that offers the largest salary gets him, provided however that he has not contracted in advance with the other company. Why is this? Simply because wherever John goes the bulk of the business is done. John gets at least two-thirds of the grain that comes into town because he is known to be strictly honest and deals square with all his customers. Mr. Wood, the manager of the other elevator is a pleasant gentleman to do business with, but Mr. Hopper has long since established a reputation for giving full weights and always checking to the full amount due and so the people remember him when they come to town with their grain. They will also remember him on election day. He is truly the people's candidate. Mr. Hopper also handles large sums of money which he checks out daily and his settlements with his employer are always satisfactory.

It is generally conceded by people of all political beliefs in every part of the county that the republican nominee for county treasurer, Geo. Newburg, of Hazard township, is one of the best selections that could have been made. Mr. Newburg is a man of large experience in county matters having served on the county board for 4 years, or two terms, and although he lived in a supervisors district where populism prevailed by a large majority, made the race for a third term and tied his opponent, and the matter was settled by a draw which resulted in his opponent being seated. Mr. Newburg has also served the people of his township as treasurer for two terms which fact has given him a good knowledge of a treasurer's duties. He has discharged the office with honesty and fidelity, accounted for every dollar entrusted to his care and has the full confidence and respect of the people. Mr. Newburg is a potent soldier of Sherman county, having moved here in 1873.

He still resides on his old original homestead, and has, since coming here, acquired a good property. All his possessions are in Sherman county for which he pays annually a neat little sum in taxes. D. Ormsbee, the nominee for sheriff, is one of the thrifty and successful farmers in the west side of the county. He has been for several years past, and is now, postmaster at Hazard and has also held the responsible position of justice of the peace of Hazard township for three successive terms. This last mentioned position has especially qualified him for the office of county judge, and his election to that office means that for the next two years the affairs of the judge's office will be ably and honestly conducted.

The republican candidate for county superintendent, Mrs. Elsie V. Kearns, is a resident in Sherman county for ten years past, and is well qualified for the position. She finished 4 years of normal college course at Vinton Normal and graduated with honors in the 1883 class. She taught school five years in Iowa before coming to Loup City and is now teaching her second term in the intermediate department of our city schools. She holds a first grade certificate and is without a peer among the teachers of Sherman county in point of education. Her teaching in Loup City has given general satisfaction. The choice of Mrs. Kearns for superintendent of public instruction was fitting and meets with hearty support from many friends of different political beliefs. Mrs. Kearns is always active in educational matters, she attends the institutes regularly and is familiar with the latest and best methods of teaching. No better selection could have possibly been made.

Mrs. Mary K. Hendrickson, who was chosen by the republican county convention as its nominee for the office of coroner is a physician of large experience and enjoys a lucrative practice. She has won an enviable reputation as a physician and her rapidly increasing practice is evidence of her popularity and ability. If elected she will serve the people with credit to herself and satisfaction to her constituents.

Walter Moon, the candidate for county surveyor, some years ago was elected and served the people of Sherman county as county judge. He was acknowledged to be one of the most conservative and best judges we ever had. He settled here in 1873, a few months after the organization of the county and has always enjoyed the full confidence of the people. His pioneer life, his interest in the welfare of our people and his efficiency and experience in public matters especially fit him to fill the position for which he has been chosen.
