This section was thoroughly drenched with a very heavy rain which fell almost continuously Saturday night, Sunday and Sunday night. The ground is again in good condition for fall plowing and many of the farmers are improving the opportunity.

Supervisor Bechtold, of Loup City township stands an excellent show of being re-elected. He has made a very conservative member and looked well to the interest of the people of his township and to county matters in general.

We can but commend the republicans of Logan and Washington townships in their choice of A. E. Sutton as candidate for supervisor. Mr. Sutton is a man of sterling integrity and if elected will make a good officer his opponent is J. P. Leisinger, another good man, and chairman of the present board of supervisors. But the people of Logan township seem to think that it is their turn to be represented and the people of Washington township do not seem to seriously object, especially since they have chosen so good a representative as A. While Sullivan, the republican-pop-ocratic nominee is running around over the district hunting the office Mr. Gaslin, the republican nominee is letting the office hunt after him.

The Germans have commenced the erection of a fine church near Hazard. The foundation is done and the building will be pushed to completion as soon as possible.
