Not Fusion But Confusion. EDITOR NORTHWESTERN: Dear Sir.—Some four week ago I wrote a letter for publication and signed myself an East Side Pop, and I kindly thank you for the space which you accorded me. In that letter I only spoke of John Minshall's ability to hold on to an office after once getting possession of it, and sighted the Litchfield village case as proof. While in town last Tuesday (the first time since I had written the article) you called my attention to the answer made by the "West Side Pop" and also the big blow-off in the Monitor of last week purporting to come from a Genuine East Side Pop. It would take too much space to undertake to answer both of these letters at once. The West Side Pops may kaffe our candidate for treasurer, Mr. Badura if they want to, but they can rest assured that if they do John Minshall will go down with the balance of the ticket. The West Side Pop intimates that Badura is not fit to run the office of county treasurer, but we are confident that he can handle it all right. As for Minshall, I don't believe that the record which he has made as Supervisor is anything to brag of. I find from the supervisors records of June 21, 1897, that coronor J. W. Jones, also on the populist ticket for re-election, was allowed \$26.90 for sitting as coroner one day in the Mrs. Henry Hiner case. John Minshall was then and is now a member of the county board, and when this claim was allowed said records reports all members of the board present. I also find that the Jurymen, viz: G. H. Scott, C. J. Bolt, F. E. Brewer, C. Littlefield and Enoch Gowin who sit in that case occupied the same length of time and on whose shoulders rested a greater responsibility than on those of Dr. Jones, only received \$2.40 each. The jury was composed of farmers and laboring men and the coroner ranks as a professional man. I suppose that John Minshall took these facts into consideration when he allowed these claims. Now Mr. Editor the confusion which has resulted from our populist convention in taking up men who have not made a first class record will likely result in the election of at least a part of the republican ticket. Everybody will not swallow that kind of reform although they be an advocate of reform in the true sense of that term. Yours for true reform. EAST SIDE POP.
