The county division proposition which was submitted to the voters of Custer county was defeated at the late election by nearly a thousand votes.

Henry Theodore Durrant, the young medical student condemned to death for the murder of Blanch Lamont and Minnie Williams in San Francisco April 1897 was by Judge Babers sentenced to be hanged today between the hours of sunrise and noon.

The state election returns summed up show that Sullivan, fusion candidate for supreme judge was elected by 12,000 plurality and the fusion candidates for regents carried the state by only 3000. Last year Holcomb, fusion candidate for governor carried the state by 22,000. Thus their majority is cut down at least 10,000.

The available balance now on hand in the United States treasury exclusive of gold is \$50,001,861. What stronger argument do you want in favor of protection. Mind you, these figures are exclusive of the gold reserve. Neither do they include the \$13,645,250 soon to be paid in by the purchasers of the Union Pacific railroad.

The sale of the Union Pacific railroad has been confirmed and the purchasers have arranged with the treasury department for the transfer of the bonds in the sinking fund and the cash payment therefor on the 32nd of the present month. These bonds which were purchased at their face value by the committee at the time of the sale of the road amount to \$13,645,250, and this amount in cash will be conveyed into the treasury, will increase the available cash balance to \$218,500,000.
