We are in receipt of a copy of the Tacoma Daily Leader which give an exhaustive account of the Klondike gold fields of Alaska.

Another marked evidence of returning prosperity is evidenced in a letter from a Chicago wholesale firm to one of our leading merchants and which states that they were behind with their orders for goods because the manufacturers could not supply the goods fast enough to keep them in stock.

Fusionists are still proclaiming that prosperity is not here, and yet there are almost two jobs to every man. The railroad companies are daily advertising for more hands. They are constantly behind with shipments because they cannot get hands enough to handle the freights and their present forces are compelled to work almost day and night in consequence. If you want a hand to do a job of work here you must speak a week ahead. Still Bryan and Bryanites are hoarsely shouting "there is no evidence of returning prosperity."
