SUPERVISORS PROCEEDINGS. Loup City, Neb. June 18, 1898. County board met this day pursuant to adjournment of April 14, 1898. Present, Henry Dunker, Chairman, John P. Leininger, Michael Rewolinski, S. N. Sweetland, Louis Bechthold, L. W. Barnes and Peter McKeon, Supervisors; J. W. Long, County attorney, and John Minshull County Clerk. On motion the contract entered into between M. L. Scott and this county for the construction of wooded bridges for this year was upon being read, approved and the chairman of this board instructed to sign such contract on behalf of Sherman county.

Bridge committee, after due examination of the new part of bridge constructed across the Middle Loup river by M. L. Scott, report same done according to plans and specifications. Report adopted. Board adjourns to June 30th, 1898.

County board in session all members present also county attorney and clerk. It appearing to the board that an error had been made by the assessor of Scott township by failing to assess the east half of the north west fourth of section 24, 13, 16, to school dist. 21 lands in the name of George Rouse. It was on motion ordered that the county clerk issue the assessment of said tract as of school dist. No 21 at value of the other lands of said sec.

It appearing to the county board that the personal property of M. Comer, in Hazard township has escaped assessment for 1898, it was on motion ordered that the clerk notify Mr. Comer, to appear before this board on the 1st day of the next regular meeting to show cause why his personal property should not be assessed.

The official bond of R. H. Goff, constable of Harrison township was examined and on motion approved. It appearing to the county board by the certificate of the town clerk of Scott township that Alice A. Colburn, the claimant for damages in the matter of the establishment of the public road prayed for by J. F. Roberts, et al, the establishment of which road has been by this board granted conditionally, on Sept. 4, 1897, had received from said township for the damage allowed by this board, and that said claimant had accepted such payment, it was on motion ordered that said road be now considered established.

It appearing from the affidavit of D. W. Vitis that certain personal property had been wrongfully assessed in 1897, in Elm township against the firm of Vitis & Terhune, and that the property so assessed had been duly assessed in said year in Harrison township, it was on motion ordered that this assessment and tax resulting therefrom in Elm twp., be stricken from the tax list.

It appearing from the claim of F. W. Starks, that a certain tract of two and one half acres of land now in name of Julia M. Fletcher, had escaped assessment for the years 1896-1897 1897 and 1898, it was on motion ordered that the county clerk enter said tract on the assessment books for said years. And it is further ordered that the claim of F. W. Starks, above mentioned, in which said Starks asks that he be paid back certain taxes paid by him on his land in section 27, be laid over until next meeting, and that said Starks present to this board a certificate of the county Surveyor showing the number of acres remaining of the east half of south west quarter section 27, 14, 16 after deducting the above tract of two and one half acres and the railroad right-of-way.

On motion the county treasurer is instructed to transfer from the general fund to the county bridge fund the sum of \$500.00. On motion the county treasurer is instructed to pay out of the county bond interest fund for outstanding county bonds to the amount of \$3,000.00.
