### OBITUARY.

Charles H. Brown, a resident of Loup City and Sherman county for several years, died at Sheridan, Wyo., Aug. 25, 1915, after an illness of less than three days, of hemorrhage of brain.

Mr. Brown was born May 18, 1867, in Howard Center, Iowa, and when ten years of age came to Butler county, Nebraska, where he lived with his parents until the spring of 1887. At that time his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Brown, moved to Sherman county and settled on a farm five miles north of Rockville. The mother died at LeSueur, Minn., at the home of her sister, Mrs. W. H. Tomlinson, August 23, 1902, and the father died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. E. G. Taylor, of our city, July 5, 1911.

On May 31, 1888, Mr. Brown was united in marriage to Miss May Lupton, a Loup City girl, who survives her husband. Mr. Brown leaves three sons, Fred W., Archie L. and Mac C., all of Sheridan, Wyo. Also two sisters, Mrs. J. F. Zeilinger, of David City, Neb., and Mrs. E. G. Taylor, of Loup City. During his life Mr. Brown engaged in farming, also in the grain business, having run an elevator several years at both Farewell and Bradshaw, Neb. He had resided in, Sheridan since May, 1908.

Funeral services were conducted at Sheridan at 2 P. M., Saturday, by Dr. Long, pastor of the Presbyterian church, where Mr. Brown had been an attendant in life. Mrs. E. G. Taylor and son Earl, with Mrs. Brown, brought the remains to David City for burial, and services were held at the residence of J. F. Zeilinger, at ten o'clock, Tuesday morning, conducted by Dr. C. Arnold Stewart, pastor of the Congregational church of David City. The pall-bearers were J. F. Zeilinger, E. L. Zeilinger, Geo. H. Zeilinger, R. W. Zeilinger and J. F. Martin, of David City, and E. G. Taylor, of Loup City. Among the relatives and friends present were W. H. Tomlinson, of LeSueur, Minn.; Mrs. C. Forsell of St. Paul, Minn.; Mrs. Fred Deardurff of Lincoln, F. C. Judevine and Mrs. Philip Smith from Elwood, and the E. G. Taylor family of Loup City.

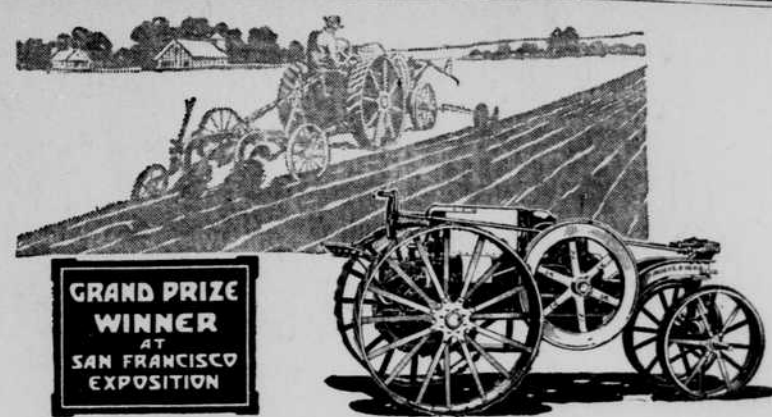

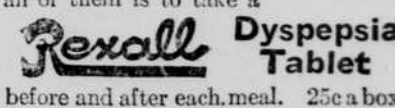
