The old timers are passing away one by one. Mrs. Moses Farnsworth was buried on Saturday afternoon. She has been an invalid for several years, and although she has been quite a care, her husband will miss the company of his life's companion. Mr. Farnsworth is an old soldier and at one time commander of this post, and

has resided in this neighborhood since 1830. Both of these old neighbors were highly respected. The survivor has the sincere sympathy of all.

Helen Clark Farnsworth was born at Fremont, Ill., October 14, 1841. She died at Litchfield, Nebr., December 2, 1915, aged 74 years. She was married to Moses Farnsworth at Fremont, Ill., May 12, 1863.

There were born to them thirteen children, three of whom died in infancy. Of the ten that lived to manhood and womanhood, eight are living at the present time, Frank and Clara E. having preceded their mother to the other world.

Mrs. Farnsworth united with the Congregational church of Fremont, Ill., at an early age. She transferred her membership to the Presbyterian church of Litchfield, where she was a member at the time of her death. She has lived an humble, earnest christian life all these many years. She brought up her family in the faith that she professed, all of the children being professed christians. Her children rise up and call her blessed. Her life has been a benediction to her husband and family. She was very highly esteemed by all who knew her. Her funeral was held from her late residence in Litchfield, Saturday, December 4, the services being conducted by the Rev. John C. Ambrose, pastor of the Presbyterian church.
