SHAW ECONOMY. No one outside of the present crowd of sham reformers at the state house would ever think of such a thing as withholding the pay of the volunteer soldiers and then parading the aggregate sum as "saved on account of the present management of the Nebraska national guard." And that is exactly what the oleo people have done. It is notorious that they let the Nebraska volunteers leave the state without their pay. Some of the boys left Lincoln on a journey to Chickamauga, and to Manila, without as much as a fifty-cent piece in their pockets. The matter was presented personally to Governor Holcomb before the departure of the boys by their friends and their parents, but the pay was not forthcoming. Many of the men were not paid for five months after the state turned the troops over to the government.

The delay in meeting the bills connected with the mobilization of the Nebraska national guard last April looks exceedingly suspicious in the light of the circular issued by the popocratic campaign committee in which the following entry appears: "By saving in maintenance of the Nebraska national guard for two years, \$35,000." If anything in the world is meaner than starving the children in the home for the friendless and feeding the helpless and the blind on butterine, it must be holding back the pay of the volunteer soldiers and parading the treasury balance as a "saving" effected by the men who were guilty of this piece of juggling and cruelty.—State Journal.

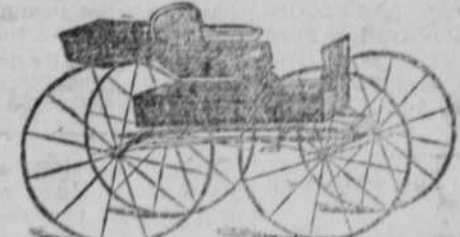

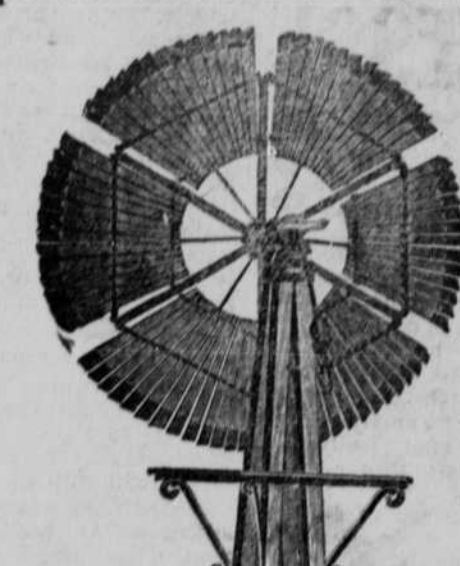
